**The Penitentiary of the Maritime Provinces.**

[From the Sackville Borderer.]

The grounds of the penitentiary and the Government cover an area about 620 acres, and are situated about half a mile above Dorchester, on the C. N. B. R. R., to the Memramcook. Comprising as the property does the farms lately owned and occupied by Geo. A. Chandler, James A. Chandler and Wm. Chandler, which farms are in an excellent state of cultivation, it is admirably adapted for the purpose of a penitentiary. It will be, being under the direction of the Government, who will not be interested in the management.

The establishment proper will be erected on the elevation overlooking the main road aforesaid and the Inverness River, which runs along the foot of the upland. The view from this prospect is beautiful and very high and somewhat extensive—in the distance can be seen Sheepdy Bay, Hopewell, and Sheepdy Mountain. Mr. Daly's supporters expecting this, were better prepared than on the first occasion, and they were attacking force to march through them cut them off. A fierce struggle took place, and Mr. Daly's supporters were again driven off some of the bludgeons from the police and beating them back.

The others, however, reasssembled by the end of the drum and after a very warm tussle became masters of the field, or rather of the Parade. They then drew a furious volley of stones at the windows of Mr. Daly's committee rooms and the heads of the occupants of the room, and having succeeded in inflicting considerable and much damage as they could, gave three cheers for the honor of 'Our Ireland' and their own home.

"Where men are not licensed sal liquors there is little or no crime." In the Province of Canterbury there are more than 1000 parishes, in which there is no public house, and in the absence of such inducement to crime and pauperism, the intelligence, morality and comfort of the people are increased. The more sal liquors we have always said would follow such state of things. The state of Mass has often been referred to. Can you tell me how much time is spent in a town there, the population of which was seven thousand, and of which the majority of the population were of the poor class? I have heard of five, there were lives lived in the town, which were visited annually by excursion parties and pleasure seekers from factories and villages, of which the town was the centre. The gentlemen mingled constantly with the crowd, and yet never saw a drop of sal liquors, either on the road, or in the town, or on the shore, or for sale, with the exception of what came in on a train for a district, which was not for sale. I am sure, who said that the justice was more rarely ladied into reservation. Moreover, ladies and gentlemen were not molested by the uneducated parties in the night, but without insult or molestation.

Heard Neal Dow writing from Portland, says: "We have three sail's officers in town, whose business it is, to hunt publicans and bring them to justice. I took Mr. Christie, from Glasgow to their premises in the basement of the City Hall, and there we found a large quantity of kegs, gun demijohns, and bottles seized from the miserable rum-sellers. One party fled, and the other was surrounded by the sailors. They showed us a barrel of beer concealed in a rice tree once banded by sawdust. A twenty gallon keg was also found with sawdust in a four barrel and marked 'extra flour.'"

The most of our lumber trade the parish is now in the hands of men, Mr. J. B. Smith, Mr. J. B. Smith and Mr. William S. Brown, who supply the smaller parties; if they were to "take wit in the head and quit it, there is no doubt it would surprisingly benefit our trade; in place of men picking up watery in snow and water until they are frozen, they would be the first of June, and then come to farm without seed or even feed their horses; whereas they might have seed as well as feed for teams to work on, and a rich bid in return for their labors.
