Centenarian Dies.
London, Ont., Aug. 5.—Alex. M. Scott died last night, aged 100 years and two months. He served under Napoleon in 1837, was in California during the gold rush and was a veteran of the American civil war. He had lived here 40 years.

His father lived to be 107, and a sister died in Scotland three years ago aged 102. Of a family of six, the youngest to die was 96.

Smelting of Ores.
Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 5.—Dr. Haanel, director of mines, has prepared a report on the electric smelting of ores, which from experiments in Sweden and at Sault Ste. Marie, he believes can be carried on to great advantage in Canada. In Sweden the process costs \$12.40 per short ton, and Dr. Haanel believes that the figure will be lower in Canada where great water powers exist.

Bisley Team Near Home.
Montreal, Aug. 5.—The steamer Tunisian, with the Canadian Bisley team on board, passed through the Straits of Belle Isle yesterday. The officials of the Allan Line expect the vessel to reach Quebec tomorrow morning and Montreal in the evening. While no official reception has been arranged there is every indication of a rousing welcome.

Col. McDougall Promoted.
London, Ont., Aug. 5.—Lieut.-Col. J. C. McDougall, R.C.R., now in command of Wolseley Barracks, will be transferred on September 1 to Halifax as chief staff officer of the Maritime Provinces. The command is the most important in Canada of its kind.
