**Northcliffe
Interviewed**
Speaks Highly of America. But
Says Allies Have Hun
Situation Well
in Hand

London, Feb. 6.—Lord Northcliffe, owner of The Times, Daily Mail, and other publications, today made the following statement to the Associated Press concerning the severing of relations with Germany:

"It is generally felt here when the history of this great world revolution is written, future generations will realize that the United States exhibited patience and forbearance to a point beyond which national honor and dignity could not go, it is hoped by the majority of English people that America will not be drawn into the war. The Entente Allies have the Prussians well in hand. Its sympathy, moral support, assistance with finance, munitions and food will be rendering our crusade an immense service, if military intervention becomes necessary. I do not doubt that America's soldiers will be as brave and efficient as the American contingent now in the trenches in France, with whom I lately spent an interesting day. Our navy has great faith in yours. The Prussian policy is not supported by which I know are protesting against a continuance of the horrors of emigration of the women in France and Belgium, have been indicated. Prussia's astounding idea of freedom of the seas is the worst possible kind of propaganda for German Kultur. There is no possibility of Germany starving Britain. The fastest steamer prosecuting the sealshery this spring will be the Eagle, commanded by Capt. Ned Bishop, while the Commodore of the Fleet, Capt. Abram, will command the Terra Nova.

The Viking will, so far as has yet been decided, be the only steamer in the Gulf this spring.

The Viking and Eagle have arrived from Sydney with their sealing coal and will not again leave port till they go to the ice.

The Ranger will be one of the staunchest ships prosecuting the voyage, she having been practically rebuilt from the water line at a cost of about \$20,000.

Capt. William Winsor will go to the ice again this spring in command of the Neptune, while Capt. Geo. Barbour will go in the Thetis.—Herald.

When One Is Burned

It's well worth while becoming acquainted with first aid in case clothing catches fire. One who knows the subject well says:

First throw the person on the ground or floor so the flames will not rise to the victim on the carpet or in a hearth rug or a blanket to stifle the flames. Use a coat if nothing else is near at hand.

Keep the flames as much as possible from the face so as to prevent the entrance of the hot air into the lungs. This can be done by beginning at the neck and shoulders with the wrapping. If the burn or scald covers considerable area there may be shock or complete prostration. In that case a few drops of aromatic spirits of ammonia should be given at once and repeated until the strength returns.

If a blister has been formed, the skin over it should not be cut, but be snipped at the edges and the water gently squeezed out. This allows the skin to remain as a protection. If the blister forms again this may have to be repeated.

There are various 'first aid' methods of treating a burn. A good application is varron oil, which is a mixture of equal parts of linseed oil and Epsom water. Sweet oil alone is good.

Lard and baking soda mixed will relieve the pain. Wheat flour is often dusted over a burn, but this hardens with the discharges and becomes rough.

For the Cook

Prune Pie
Wash half a pound of prunes and soak in enough water to cover. Cook in same water until soft. Remove stone, cut prunes in quarters and mix with scant half cup sugar and one tablespoon lemon juice. Reduce liquor to one and one half tablespoon. Line plate with paste, cover with prunes, pour over liquor, dot with one and one half teaspoons butter and dredge with one tablespoon flour. Bake with an upper crust.

Cream Pie
Bake three nine inch circular pieces of pastry and put together with a cream filling. For filling mix seven eighths cup sugar, one third cup flour and one eighth teaspoon salt and pour on one and one half cups of scalded milk. Cook in double boiler fifteen minutes. Add yolks two eggs and cook two minutes. Cool, add one half cup cream beaten stiff and vanilla.
