Deducting weight of balloon, motor and battery, 2,200 pounds would be left for passengers and ballast. In calm weaher such an air-ship should have a speed of twelve to fifteen miles an hour, and in currents its direction could be directed to some extent. The battery power, however, would last but a short time, so that a balloon constructed on this plan would evidently be valuable only for purposes of experiment; while this estimate makes it quite apparent that the motor described would, in the somewhat improbable event of the practical application of power to baloons, be found much less economical
