The subject for discussion is always to be chosen by the visiting speakers, the side by the home team. There will be three speakers from each college, who will be allowed fifteen minutes each, with an extra ten minutes for the closing orator. One judge will: be appointed, who cannot be a lecturer, professor or instructor of any of the colleges taking part. Decision will be made on a basis of two-thirds for argument and one-third for presentation. It has been agreed to have a committee, known as the Maritime Intercollegiate Debating Committee, consisting of one representative from each college, who will settle any disputed points and make amendments or additions to the scheme.

ALBANY, Nov. 17.—That a kiss given during a courtship has a monetary value has been established by the Appellate Division in a decision laid down in the case of Miss Frances Petit of Kalway, Saratoga County. Miss Petit was wooed by a blacksmith named Tittemore. After a courtship of fourteen years he jilted her. She then brought an action against hm for breach of promise, fixing the damages at \$50,000. The specific allegation made by her was that she had given Tittemore 1236 kisses, which she valued at \$48 a kiss. Each kiss she had noted in a diary. The jury thought the rate excessive and reduced it to \$2.37 a kiss, awarding her \$5,000. The Appellate Division without opinion affirms the judgment of the jury. Since the award Blacksmith Tittemore has gone into voluntary bankruptoy.
