**MANITOBA GOVERNMENT IS SUSTAINED BY FAIR MAJORITY**

TORONTO, March 7.—The Roblin government appears to have secured a further lease of power as the result of today's provincial elections in Manitoba, and it looks as if their majority would be about a dozen. The Liberal leader, Brown, was defeated in Portage La Prairie and Attorney General Campbell is also probably defeated in Morris. The campaign has been a hot one, and there are already declarations of protest against the return of several leading Conservatives. The day was fine and a large vote was polled in most places.

**DUCHESS CONSUELO TO LIVE "HUSTLING DRESS" FOR MEN IN WORKING GIRLS' HOTEL**  
Engages Suite of Rooms at Martha Washington in New York—May Do Social Rescue Work

NEW YORK, March 7.—Consuelo, Duchess of Marlborough, is coming to live for an indefinite period at the Martha Washington, originally a working girls' hotel, according to a W. E. Eager, the lessee of that hotel. She is due in New York on April 13. Eager says that a suit of ten rooms has been engaged by her, and that they are being decorated by her direction—four rose and the rest in blue.

When the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough subscribed to separation papers early in January, it was suggested that she would come to America this summer, but there has been no definite word before. Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont, the duchess' mother, has been abroad all winter. Her father, William K. Vanderbilt, is also abroad.

Under the terms of the Marlborough separation it is a question whether the boys, the Marquis of Blandford, now in his tenth year, and Lord Ivor Charles Spencer Churchill, who will be nine in October, could be with their mother here for any length of time. The agreement is understood to have been that, although she could take her sons to the continent during the holidays, the Duchess agreed not to bring them to America for "any extended period" while they were minors.

Last week it was announced by the London Weekly Dispatch that the Duchess of Marlborough was going to join the church army and do social rescue work. The Rev. Colin Campbell, secretary of the Church Army's Social Department, was quoted as saying, "The Rev. Mr. Carville, our chief, about three weeks ago visited the Duchess at Nice. Many times she has opened work for us and garden parties have been held at Blenheim. Mr. Carville visited Blenheim as the guest of the Duke after the unhappy differences between the Duke and Duchess."

Mrs. Hermann Oelrichs, who is a sister of Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt, Jr., said tonight she had not heard that the Duchess of Marlborough contemplated visiting America and stopping at the Martha Washington.

**SKIN OF FOUR PERSONS SAVES BURNED CHILD**  
Three Hundred Pieces of Outlets Grafted on Little Girl's Body

PITTSBURGH, March 7.—Physicians at the Prosythria Hospital announced today that Iola McKenzie, the 6-year-old daughter of George McKenzie, of 2009 Fifth Avenue, will recover. The child was burned over more than one-third of her body, which usually produces death.

Four persons, including Miss Annie B. Martin, the little girl's school teacher, permitted skin to be taken from their bodies, and 300 pieces of cuticle from these four persons were grafted over the burned surface.

The grafting was a complete success, and the surgeons declare it is one of the most remarkable cases on record.

**WOMAN SHOT BY MONTREAL NEGRO**  
Lived Together as Man and Wife in Montreal Boarding House

MONTREAL, March 7.—There was a shooting affray in a boarding house on St. Antoine street, principally patronized by negroes, tonight, and as a result Mary Brown, a white woman, is in the General Hospital with a bullet in her breast, and John Miner is a fugitive from the police. Miner is colored, and he and the woman have been living together as man and wife for some time. Miner was very jealous and quarrels were frequent. Tonight the couple came in about six o'clock and went to their room. Soon after violent quarrelling was heard and another colored man boarding in the house named Jones, went up to restore peace. When he entered the room the woman was holding Miner back. The latter had a revolver in his hand, and as soon as he saw Jones, threatened to shoot him.

Three men promptly fled and telephoned for the police. Just as he reached the bottom of the stairs five shots rang out. When the police responded they found the woman lying on the floor of the room with a bullet wound in the breast, while Miner had sought safety in flight. The woman was removed to the hospital, where it was found that her injury was not serious. The police are looking for Miner.
