**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**
Any even numbered section of Dom-
inion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan
and Alberta, excepting 8 and 28,
not reserved, may be homesteaded by
any person who is the sole head of a
family, or any male over 18 years of
age, to the extent of one-quarter sec-
tion of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at
the local land office for the district in
which the land is situated.
The homesteader is required to per-
form the conditions connected there-
with under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence
upon and cultivation of the land in
each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the
father is deceased) of the homesteader
resides upon a farm in the vicinity of
the land entered for, the requirements
as to residence may be satisfied by
such person residing with the father or
mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent
residence upon farming land owned by
him in the vicinity of the homestead,
the requirements as to residence may
be satisfied by residence upon the said
land.
Six months' notice in writing should
be given to the Commissioner of
Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention
to apply for patent.

NOTHING DOING.

Evidently the bottom has dropped
out of the recent civic agitation, and
Mr. W. D. Baskin's statement that St.
John was suffering from nothing more
nor less than a periodic pre-election
spasm appears to have been a fairly
true description. The somewhat effe-
vescent outbreak of two weeks ago in-
dicated that public feeling in St. John
is like a hibernating animal, difficult
to arouse, violent when half awake,
but liable to drop off into deep slumber
before much has been accomplished.
The interest manifested was not with-
out effect, for amendments of much
importance have been added to the
election bill as the result of it. But
this is not enough. If the same alder-
men are to be returned this year, such
action will look very much like ap-
proval of their policy, which, indeed,
is not a true interpretation of public feel-
ing. It will, however, indicate that the
opposition to the course now being
pursued is not sufficient to arouse an
active campaign against those in au-
thority. Business men of the type who
are needed at the council board are
unwilling to become candidates, others
who are not particularly desirable as
aldermen, are anxious to run, and there
is little doubt that a number of them
will be nominated. Still to date there
are but few who have definitely sig-
nified their intentions and the outlook
at present is that there will be contests
in not more than three wards, possibly
only in two. There must of necessity
be two new aldermen next year. Mr.
Baskin may either contest Guys
against Ald. Baxter or appear as a
candidate at large, although the latter
is improbable. In the event of a con-
test in Guys it is interesting to note
that in the last election Mr. Baskin
had a large majority in that ward,
though Ald. Baxter polled a big vote
in the rest of the city.

Mr. J. K. Kelley intends opposing
Ald. Pickett in Victoria; Mr. A. W. W.
son will endeavor to oust Ald. Bullock
in Queens, and Mr. J. V. Russell hopes
for success against Ald. Willet in Duf-
ferin. Any one of these three may,
before nomination day, decide to run
as alderman at large, along with Dr.
Fink. There is talk of a number of
other candidates, but nothing which
can be relied on, and the outlook is
that the coming election will be a very
tame affair.

PLAYING A LONE HAND.
The recent insinuations concerning
members of the federal cabinet fol-
lowed by definite charges against one
minister in particular create a situa-
tion which can only be regarded as
most unfortunate from a national point
of view. It is generally to be de-
plored that any man, eminent in the
service of the Canadian people, should
feel it his duty to retire from office
as a preparatory step in meeting and
refuting statements affecting his pri-
vate reputation. Yet at the same time
it is better, far better, that the most
recent developments have occurred,
than that the country should seem to
rest in any sense under a shadow.
The Frederick Giesner, owned and
managed by a company, of which Mr.
George Fowler, M. P., is president,
published direct and damaging state-
ments against Hon. H. R. Emmerson.
The latter has promptly given his an-
swer. Instead of appealing to parlia-
ment and asking the appointment of
a commission of investigation which he
might well have done, and which would
have amply met the views of all fair-
minded men, he has voluntarily relin-
quished his office and taken up the
cudgels in his own hands. Mr. Em-
merson's action in instituting pro-
ceedings against the papers pub-
lishing the charges referred to, will no
doubt bring matters speedily to a
head. His course shows fearless deter-
mination, a desire to profit by none of
that protection which might be se-
cured through a parliamentary com-
mittee. He has a definite statement to
meet, and his first step in doing so
would certainly indicate that he is not
in the least afraid of the outcome.

INCOMES IN FRANCE.
In view of the income tax bill which
is causing widespread discussion in
France the following figures concern-
ing the wealth of the French nation
will be of interest. It is seen that
there are but a comparatively small
number of persons with large annual
incomes, and that the greater bulk of
the money is held by people of small
means. For this reason there is not
to be found in France such differences
between rich and poor as are noted in
England and America.
On January 1, 1906, there were in
France 3,029,525 persons who derived an
income from what is called here a
"rente"—that is to say, they hold title
deeds or bonds which assure them a
yearly income. They are as follows:
15,716 people with 1,500 francs, 21,222
with 1,000, 38,133 with 500, 82,281 with
200 francs, 123,140 with 200 francs, 266,
188 with 100 francs, 298,271 with 50
francs, 601,245 with 20 francs, 1,533,220
with 10 francs.

ACROSS CAPE COD**

BOSTON, Mass., April 2.—The Bos-
ton, Cape Cod and New York Canal
Company, the corporation who have
been granted the right to construct a
ship canal across Cape Cod today an-
nounced that the bid of the Cape Cod
Construction Company, the only bid
received for the construction of the
canal, has been accepted by the canal
company, subject to the approval of
the joint board of the Harbor and Land
Commissioners and the Railroad Com-
missioners. The Cape Cod's construc-
tion Company's bid was \$11,990,000. The
Construction Company is headed by
August Belmont, William Barclay Par-
sons, John B. McDonald and Dewitt C.
Flanagan, and is in reality a part of
the Canal Company.

\$95,000,000 IN DEATH DUES

Receipts in Britain Last Year Beat all
Records.

LONDON, April 2.—It is now known
that the receipts from death duties
during the fiscal year just ending beat
all previous records. The total, in-
round figures, will be \$95,000,000. Since
the passage of Sir William Vernon
Harcourt's Finance Act two years ago
the total receipts from death du-
ties have exceeded \$1,000,000,000. The
Lancashire fund paid on the estate
was \$4,500,000, on that of Geo. Smith,
generally known as "Chicago Smith,"
who lived at the Reform Club at an
average rate of eighteen shillings a day.
