QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS OF INTEREST TO FARMERS

(Continued from Page Two.) attendance 4,674, being an average of 55.

In 1902, 160 meetings were held, total attendance 8,084, being an average of 50.2.

In 1903, 162 meetings were held, total attendance 7,146, being an average of 44.1.

In 1904, 139 meetings were held, total attendance 5,224, being an average of 38.2.

1,263 addresses were delivered at these meetings during the four years. The Dominion election campaign and severe stormy evenings interfered with the attendance in 1904, reducing the average.

The speakers sent out by the Farmers' Institute carry to a certain extent the college to the people. One of the main benefits is to induce organization and co-operation among the farmers, as well as professors, notes, exchange experiences, and thus become more conversant with the best and most profitable methods of farming, stock raising, dairying, etc.

In this province the system is, comparatively speaking, in its infancy. It is the improvement of live stock, more attention is being given to the proper feeding and care of animals, a marked increase in the quantity and quality of butter for bacon.

There was paid during the last fiscal year for the encouragement of dairying as follows: For the purchase of cheese and butter factories and skimming stations, \$2,196.74.

For salaries of three dairy superintendents at \$1,200 each, \$3,600. For expenses of dairy superintendents, \$2,218.49.

There was paid out to encourage stock raising for beef production: To the Canadian Pacific Railway, one-half of W. W. Hubbard's salary, \$500. To Maritime Stock Breeders' Association, \$400.

A portion of the Farmers' Institute expenses, the exact proportion of which it is impossible to estimate; nearly all the speakers had beef production on their list of subjects, and it was wherever called for, by the local institute.

The expenditures were made through the channels outlined above. No expenditure was made by the office of the department of agriculture except under the direction of the commissioner.

Butter factories, when fully completed and fitted with cold storage to the satisfaction of the dairy superintendent, receive a bonus of \$500, and skimming stations \$150. Cheese factories, when fully completed and running to the satisfaction of the dairy superintendent, receive a bonus of \$150.

In 1897 there were 47 cheese factories in operation. For details as to location, see pages 172 and 173 of 1897 Agricultural Report.

There are at present 53 factories in operation, which turned out last year 1,948,428 pounds of cheese, which sold for \$1,129,291.

In 1900 the total number of patrons of cheese and butter factories in the province was 3,094; in 1904 the total number was 5,447. In the district north of Fredericton the number of patrons of cheese and butter factories in 1904 was: York Co., 270; Carleton Co., 592; Victoria Co., 322; Madawaska Co., 262; Gloucester Co., none; Northumberland Co., 128; Miramichi Co., 128; and St. John's Co., 169.
