The News in Short Meter

LOCAL. Non-suit Ordered. In the Fairville court yesterday morning William Nixon was sued by Oscar D. Hanson on a promissory note of \$107.57. The note stated that it should be paid in partial payments of \$2 each. There was no specification as to when the payments should be made. A. Barry who appeared for the defendant secured a non-suit on this ground and also that the plaintiff sued for the entire sum the Fairville court had no jurisdiction over the case.

The River Commission. M. G. Teed has returned from Van Buren, where he attended the sessions of the St. John River Commission. The commission has adjourned until July 23 when it will meet in Augusta, Maine. The engineers' report as to the facilities for storing water on the upper St. John has not yet been received by the commission and until this comes to hand there is no indication as to how long the inquiry may last.

Case Dismissed. In the Circuit Court yesterday morning the charge of assault against Joseph Nealey was dismissed. Nealey was charged with assaulting Hilda May Craft a ten year old girl living in Lancaster. A. A. Wilson, K.C., appeared for the crown and J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., and J. King Kelley, K.C., for the prisoner.

Two drunks were fined the usual amounts and Margaret Sullivan was remanded until further inquiry can be made into her case.

Big Auto Parade Planned. The committee in charge of the Old Home Week celebration has sent letters to owners of automobiles in the province inviting them to cooperate in a mammoth automobile parade to be held here during that week. It is expected there will be at least 500 cars in line and the feature will be the biggest of the kind ever held in Eastern Canada.

PROVINCIAL. A Short Lived Strike. Sussex, June 26.—Demanding nine hours a day in place of ten, about 25 employees of the Sussex Manufacturing Co. went out on strike Tuesday morning. The employers refused to yield to the demands and the strike lasted eight of the strikers returned to work. Business had to be suspended for a while on Tuesday, but today the work is going on as usual.

Chatham High School Entrance Exams. Chatham, June 26.—The results of the High School entrance examinations held here are announced today. Forty-seven pupils tried the examinations and of these Miss Marion Filinger led with a total of 92 1/2. The total number taking the examinations was 47. Passed division one; 7; passed division one, conditional; 2; division two, 13; division two, conditional; 1; division three; 14; failed, 3.

GENERAL. Fire in Halifax Machine Shop. Halifax, June 26.—Fire today in the plant of V. and A. Muir, engineers and machinists, did between eight and ten thousand dollars damage. All the patterns were destroyed; covered by insurance. Strike Affects Prices of Clothes. Montreal, June 26.—As the result of the strike of the garment workers, it is predicted here that there will be an advance in the prices of ready-made clothing for fall and winter. All the factories are rushed with orders and unable to keep up with the demand. This being the case it is likely that dealers will be forced to import clothing from the United States which is subject to a duty of 35 per cent, and a freight rate equal to 5 per cent. Ready-made clothing factories in Toronto, Hamilton and London are now working overtime to fill the orders which Montreal houses are unable to keep pace with.

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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age may be granted a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

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
