WEALTHY WIDOW
MURDERED AND
JEWELS STOLEN

Burglars missed strong
box containing jewelry
worth from \$250,000 to
\$500,000—Servant con-
fesses he admitted burg-
lars.

New York, Sept. 9.—Osway Talas,
a Russian Finn, for two and one-half
months a hall boy in the home of Mrs.
Elizabeth Nichols, the aged widow who
met death last night at the hands of
masked men who robbed her of gems
valued at \$100,000, was arrested today
after he had confessed the police as-
sert, to having played a part in the
crime.

He was formally charged with mur-
der. All other servants in the house
were freed of suspicion, Deputy Po-
lice Commissioner Lord announced.
Preliminary examination of Mrs.
Nichols' body revealed the probability
that she had died of fright, and not
of strangulation as at first supposed,
Mr. Lord said. An autopsy to be per-
formed later will disclose the exact
cause of death.

Although the burglars stripped their
victim's fingers and ears of diamonds
and other jewels worth \$10,000, they
failed to rattle the strongbox of her
safe in which she kept gems valued at
from \$250,000 to \$500,000.

The murdered woman was the wi-
dow of James E. Nichols, one of the
founders of the wholesale grocery
house of Austin, Nichols & Company.
She was 60 years old. When her hus-
band died a year ago he left her prop-
erty valued at nearly \$2,000,000.

Talas, in what the police claim was
his confession, is alleged to have said
that for some time several men had
been endeavoring to get him to "stand
in with them" to rob Mrs. Nichols, but
that he had always refused such ad-
vances until Tuesday night when he
consented to take part in the scheme,
upon the understanding that Mrs.
Nichols was not to be harmed and that
only the jewels she wore on her per-
son were to be taken.

The police quote Talas as saying
that the men arrived at the Nichols
home at 9 o'clock last night by ap-
pointment and that in response to a
possible ring at the basement door he
admitted them.

He told of being backed into a cor-
ner by the men and of the finding by
them of the maid in the butler's room.
The maid, he is alleged to have said,
was threatened and tied up. One man
was left to stand guard over her while
the others hurried upstairs to the
apartment of Mrs. Nichols. Talas is
said to have asserted that he was en-
tirely ignorant of what happened in
the apartment as he heard nothing.
He said, however, that the men were
upstairs ten or fifteen minutes, leaving
by the basement door and passing by
without any comment.
