ST. JOHN STUDENTS IN HONOR LISTS

English Valedictorian is J. E. Cahill, Well Known Athlete of Moncton.

Moncton, N. B., June 16.—The fifty-seventh annual commencement exercises of the University of St. Joseph's College began on Wednesday evening with a concert in Lefebvre Hall, Saint Joseph's.

There were many visitors, including His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc of St. John; Senator J. A. MacDonald, Amherst, and Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, St. John, who gave addresses.

Rev. Father Guertin, president of St. Joseph's, gave a review of work of the year during which 400 students were enrolled, of which 288 were from New Brunswick.

He announced that an M. A. course would hereafter be given by the college. The final convocation and distribution of prizes took place today.

The English valedictorian is J. Everett Cahill, of Moncton, well known in local athletic circles, and the French valedictorian is Mr. Aderic Bourgeois, of Cocagne.

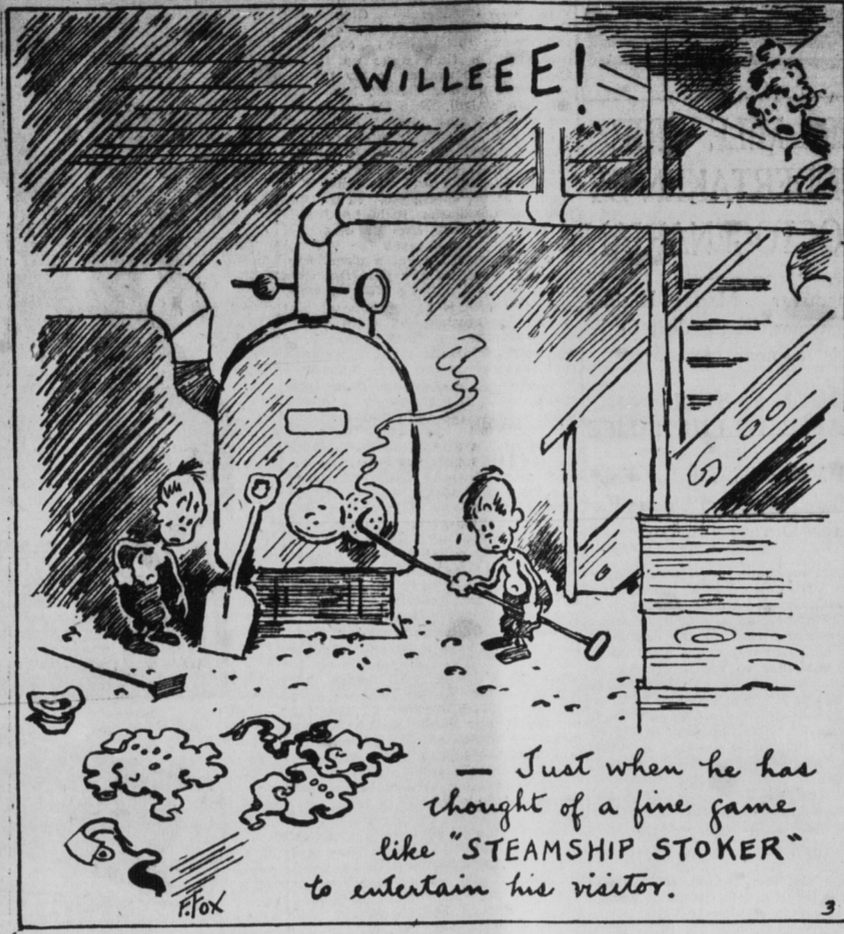

Newcastle Citizens Number Over 4,000

Population at Last Census Was Only 2,945—Lost His Eye While Chasing Cow.

Newcastle, June 16.—His Lordship Bishop Chalmers paid his first official visit to Newcastle yesterday where he was greeted by a large congregation at St. Mary's Church. An address of welcome was presented by Hon. John Morrissey on behalf of the congregation at the conclusion of which His Lordship addressed the congregation. This morning he administered the sacrament of confirmation to a class of fifty composed of 27 girls, 22 boys and one adult. This afternoon the bishop is conducting confirmation at Bridgetown, Eel Ground and tomorrow will visit St. Thomas Church, Redbank and St. James Seville on the same mission.

Population up one third. An increase of over one third in population during the past ten years will be the record of Newcastle according to the census now being taken. The local enumerators have to date listed over 3,800 names and have considerable more territory to cover yet which will bring the population of Newcastle over the 4,000 mark. The population in 1911 was given as 2,945.

Lost His Eye. Ernest Clarke of Chelmsford was the victim of a distressing accident on Sunday last. While chasing an angry cow which was molesting his children a stick which he was using broke and one of the pieces entered his eye injuring it so badly that he was removed to the Miramichi Hospital this week and the injured optic removed.

The funeral of the late Richard Hutchinson will take place from the old homestead at Douglastown at nine o'clock tomorrow morning. The remains will be taken to Boston for interment.

Former M. P. Once More Arrested

Arthur Ecrement, Twice Acquitted, Held in Connection With Horse Race Case.

Montreal, June 16.—Arthur Ecrement, ex-M.P. for Berthier, has been again arrested on a warrant signed by Judge Choquet at the request of the Buffalo authorities, who asked for his detention in connection with the horse racing case, wherein Michael Connolly, a Montreal broker, claims to have been swindled out of the sum of \$125,000 by a wire-tapping scheme. It is understood that he will fight extradition. Ecrement has been acquitted twice of charges arising out of the Connolly case, once in Buffalo and once in Montreal.

Toronto, June 16.—Eight students have been expelled from Toronto University definitely and five others have been suspended for various terms for impersonating and copying at the spring examinations. The names are not mentioned. In the case of the expelled students the examinations of the present year are cancelled and they are debarred from registering in any other department of the university. Some are refused registration for the sessions of '21-22 and '22-23.

Seals Destroying Salmon Fisheries

Big Losses Are Reported by All Fishermen Along the Miramichi River.

Chatham, N. B., June 16.—Seals are proving a great source of annoyance and loss to the Miramichi Bay salmon fishermen. People from down river say they are so numerous that if the salmon are not taken out of the nets almost as soon as they are caught the seals invariably get them, not only destroying the fish, but in many cases ruining the nets. The price paid for salmon at the nets is \$2 each.
On overhauling his net the other morning a drifter got six salmon and took the heads of fourteen others out of the meshes. How many fish were destroyed completely it is hard to estimate. A suggestion is made that the seals might be killed by mining. They bask in the sun in large numbers on the beaches after dining on a sumptuous salmon breakfast, and it is suggested their laund haunts be mined and the pirates blown up.

Enormous Robberies

Washington, June 16.—Insurance officials reported today that robberies of commodities, including silks, furs, cigars and cotton goods, within a radius of two hundred miles of New York City, had totalled \$50,000,000 in the last year. Of this, about \$6,000,000 had been recovered.
