JAPS HAVE LIKELY CUT OFF VLADIVOSTOK.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 29.—It has been impossible to obtain direct confirmation of the report from Hakodate that Vladivostok is blockaded by Japanese vessels, but it is not considered improbable that the Japanese landing operations in Korea the Russian warships to the north were a constant menace, and blockading them would be the most effective means of securing non-interference. Furthermore, it is worthy of note that for more than one week no word has been allowed to come from Vladivostok, and this in itself is strong presumptive evidence that important events are transpiring.
