Miss Sadie Lethbridge, daughter of J. G. Lethbridge, M. P. P., and Mrs. Lethbridge of Glencoe, is dead at Honan, China, where she had been engaged in mission work for six years, according to a cablegram received by Mr. Lethbridge last Thursday morning. It was not known that Miss Lethbridge nad been ill and the news of her death was a great shock to parents and friends here.

Miss Lethbridge vas one of a party of nurses for whom the late Dr. Menzies gave his life recently while defending the mission station at Honan from an attack of bandits.

The late Miss Lethbridge was quite young and was well known here and in Ekfrid, where she spent her early days. She was planning a trip homefrom China when she had completed another year of work there.

DEVELOPING FLAX INDUSTRY

The development of the flax industry in Western Ontario was considered by the growers of the district at a conference held in London last week. It is claimed by the growers that the present annual acreage of about 20,000 in Ontario could be expanded to 300,000 if a successful pulling machine could be developed.
