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MANY INCOME
TAX RETURNS
BEING FILED

Stacks of Letters Arriving On Every Mail.

100,000 FORMS SENT OUT

Inspector Tambling and Large Staff Working Overtime To Keep Up With Rush.

The filing of the income tax returns at the office of the inspector for the London district increases in volume from day to day. Some idea of the amount of work involved may be gathered from the huge stack of letters containing inquiries and filled-up forms which arrives with each mail, especially in the morning.

But this is nothing to what we shall have later," said Inspector of Taxes George Tambling to The Advertiser.

About the middle of April we may have as many as 15,000 letters or more arriving daily.

Over 100,000 forms have been distributed to 500 postoffices in the district, and, of course, a large number are not direct from the inspector's office. A large staff is kept constantly busy in dealing with this work.

Considerable doubt appears to exist as to what steps, if any, ought to be taken by those whose income is below the figure rendered taxable by the act. In a case of this kind the person concerned may voluntarily file a return, giving the necessary information, and if this is verified later by his employer's return, all is well. But if his income is hovering dangerously near to the border line of taxation, and the inspector sends him a form to fill up, he is liable to heavy penalties if the return is not filed within the number of days allowed. If sent a form by the inspector he must fill it up, whether he is liable to taxation or not.

PERMITS REQUIRED
BY ALL OWNERS OF
REVOLVERS OR GUNS

Police Commission May Take Drastic Action in Matter.

When the police commission meets, the question of permit forms being printed so that all guns in the homes of citizens may be registered in accordance with the amendment to the criminal code which requires every citizen owning a gun to have a permit, will be discussed.

Chief of Police Robert Birrell stated Wednesday that it will mean four hours' work each day for a considerable length of time, for one man to issue permits for revolvers and rifles now in the possession of the holders. Seventy-five per cent of the people of London possessed fire-arms, he estimated.

PURCHASER WOULD
PAY COMMISSION
ON TRANSACTION

If Housing Commission Allows Real Estate Agents To Sell Houses.

Offers from two real estate firms to sell houses erected by the housing commission will come before that body at its meeting on Thursday night. It is possible that the commission may accept one of these in place of its present plan of selling through a business agent, F. B. Lavender.

The housing act will not permit the sale of houses except on a cost basis, and the commission will therefore not be able to pay the company making the sale. According to Commissioner E. R. Dennis, other arrangements can be made which will not violate the conditions of the housing act. The real estate men can act as agents for the commission and will have nothing to do with the housing commission. They will make all arrangements for the loan and relieve the purchaser of other responsibilities. This will be a transaction between the prospective purchaser and the agent, and will have nothing to do with the housing commission. The commission will sell the houses at cost, and any fee paid to the agent will be from the purchaser. Citizens who wish to deal directly with the commission will still be permitted to do so.

The advantage of the plan, Commissioner Dennis claims, is that the firms making the offer have applications for homes from any first-class prospective purchasers. Many of these are willing to pay a substantial fee to an agent to get them a house of any kind. If the agent can arrange the sale of houses built by the commission it will help that body in the disposal of its property and will also be to the advantage of the men buying the house.

Mr. Dennis stated that a similar plan has been operated in St. Catharines for some time. A firm there arranged loans from the housing commission, had plans drawn, and superintended the actual building in return for fees paid to them.

RAILWAYMEN'S KICK
ABSURD, SAYS BAKER

No Violation of Secrecy of the Ballot by Publication of Figures.

"The thing's absurd. We are bound to publish the reports of the election and we can't help announcing the result of the railwaymen's poll," City Clerk Baker declared today.

Mr. Baker pointed out today that the returning officer is bound to announce the total vote polled and it has always been the custom to give the vote by sub-divisions as well. Even if no announcement of the railway poll was made, the results of all the sub-divisions were given out any person would be able to learn the railwaymen's vote by subtracting the total vote on election day from the complete total. The remainder would be the vote of the railwaymen.

The individual secrecy of the ballot was kept inviolate, Mr. Baker declared. The manner in which any railwayman voted is something which the man himself alone knows. There was not the least inkling of the results from the railway poll until the results of the whole election were announced Saturday at 6 o'clock.

Inspector of Humane Society Visits 47 Stables During Search.

Although he has inspected 47 stables in the north end of the city, George Tustin, inspector for the local Humane Society, failed to find any trace of a horse which, according to a local paper, was badly burned one day last week through the carelessness of its owner.

Mr. Tustin claims that if the story was true it was a case which should be investigated by the society.

According to the story, the owner sought to rid a rather decrepit animal from lice, by soaking its infested hide with kerosene. Later when he wished to see if the remedy had taken effect he struck a match near the horse with the result that the kerosene was ignited and before the flames could be extinguished the animal suffered many severe burns.

Immediately after the publication of the story Mr. Tustin started his search.
