
The Revised War Service Gratuity

For the benefit of the returned men of the city and district the following particulars with regard to the new rate of allowances recently adopted by the Government are given. For some time past the allowances for returned men have been the subject of much controversy, but the appended detailed War Service Gratuity will clear any doubts on the matter. I. Men discharged before 11th Nov. 1918 are not entitled to this gratuity unless they served at the front in actual theatre of war. All those who

have served at the front are entitled to the difference between the amount of Post Discharge Pay received and the amounts authorized below, less any overpayments or debit balances not yet recovered. Service Overseas 2. For the members of the land forces who have served at any time overseas, which means on the strength for pay and allowances of some recognized overseas establishments and were on the strength of the Land Forces, on active service on the date of the Armistice 11 Nov. 1918 the gratuity is granted as follows. For three years service or over: 183 days pay and allowance. For two years service and under three years, 153 days pay and allowance. For one years service and under two years, 122 days pay and allowance. For less than one year, 92 days pay and allowance. It is further provided that if in any case the amount of 31 days pay and allowance is less than \$100.00 in the case of a man with dependents who


