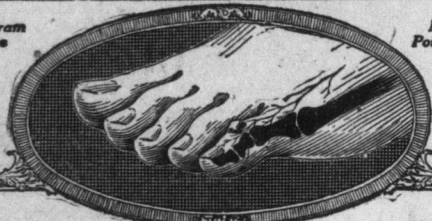

Note the Pointed Corn

Why Corns Hurt

Note this diagram picture of a corn. Note its conical shape. The cause of the corn is pressure. And pressure makes it hurt. The point of the corn is pushed into the nerves. 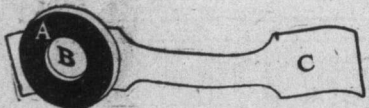

Miss Cookhuit, of Brantford, is the guest of Miss Marjorie Carthen, King Street.

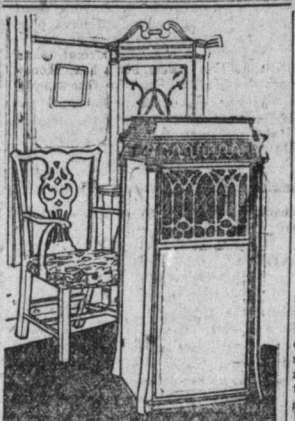
Miss Elsie Chalcraft, of Toronto, is a visitor in town this week, the
