tribes or nations respectively, all the possessions, rights, and priviloges, which they may have enjoyed or been entitled to in 1811, revious to such hostilities. Provided always, that such tribes or varions shall agree to desist from all hostilities against His Britannic rajesty and his subjects, upon the ratification of the present Treaty Ling notified to such tribes or nations, and shall so desist accordingly.

ARTICLE N.

Whereas the traffic in slaves is irreconcluble with the principles of himsprity and justice, and whereas her. His Majesty and the is find States are desirous of continuing their effects to promote it's tire abolition, it is hereby agreed that both the contracting parties all use their best endeavours to accomplish so desirable an effect.

ARTICLE XI.

This Treaty, when the same shall have been falled on both and without alteration by either of the Contracting Parties, and we ratifications mutually exchanged, shall be binding on both paron, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Washington, in the in faith whereof, we the respective Menipotentiaries have signed

willis Treaty, and have thereunto affixed our seals.
