HEARST OUTRUN BY SOCIALIST

New York Gave Russell for
Governor Third Highest
Vote.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—With California, New York and Wisconsin as their banner States, the Socialists have polled a vote of huge proportions and 60 per cent. greater than their vote two years ago.

In New York Charles Edward Russell, Socialist candidate for Governor, received more votes than Hopper, Independence League candidate, or William Randolph Hearst, league candidate for Lieutenant-Governor. His vote in New York city, will be about 27,300, and in the State about 65,000. Russell is a magazine writer.

In Buffalo the Socialist vote jumped from 715 two years ago to 3,000. Every part of the country shows Socialist gains except the lower Middle West. Milwaukee elected Victor Berger to Congress, Socialists' most notable achievement.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 6, 1912.—That Socialist votes yesterday elected George F. Cotterill, mayor of Seattle is shown by a study of the returns.

Although the Socialists elected none of their four candidates, they polled a vote ranging from 16,882 for C. J. Jacobs, candidate for councilman, to 24,341 for E. J. Brown, candidate for corporation council. The Socialist vote last year was 4,680.
