London. Oct. 14.-The arrangements for the reception of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York on their return to this country are now under

consideration. It is understood that the King, and Queen will leave London on the afternoon of Thursday, the 31st inst., and proceed to Portsmouth. On arrival at he dockyard their Majesties will embark on the King's new Yacht, the Victoria and Albert (Commodore the Hon. Hedworth Lambton), and remain here during the night.

Early on the morning of Nov. 1 the royal yacht will steam out of harbor and put out to meet the Ophir, which will be escorted by ships of war. Details of the naval program have not been settled, but it is certain that it will be most interesting and impressive. The King and Queen and the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York will leave Por smouth for Lon-

REACHED POLE

Bel ef that overdrup Must Have Suc cet deu-Negative L vider Ce.

Christiania, Oct. 14.-A-strong belief exists in Scandinavia that Captain Sverdrup of the Fram has reached the north pole and is now returning home. Sverdrup has been away on his expedition round Greenland for 40 months. As Lieutenant Peary did not se him in the north of Greenland, it is thought the brave Norwegian never intended to go round Greenland to reach the pole. In the summer of 1899 Sverdrup was on the northwest coast of Greenland, Lincoln's Sea, to the north thereof, was ice free the following summer, according to Peary. Scientists declare there is a strong probability that Sverdrup seized the opportunity and reached the pole. No fear is entertained as to the safety of the expedition, which was provisioned for five years.

Captain Otto Sverdrup started from Christiania in the Fram in June, 1898. Rumors reached Gothenburg recently but no positive information has yet come to hand. When Sverdrup set ploring the northern coast of Green-land by rounding it, but the possibil-ity of his making a dash for the pole itself was not out of the question. He had previously accompanied Nansen in his voyage with the Fram.
