It shows that before entering into an agreement with the Electric Development Co, for the doubling of its privileges in the matter of development of power, the Board of Park Commissioners prepared a memorandum for the guidance of ed a memorandum for the guidance of the Ontario Government. The memor-andum was submitted to the Govern-ment in November last. The argu-ments for and against the granting of the privilege of developing 125.000 ex-tra horse power are very nearly "balanced," but that the board, on grounds of public policy, argues strongly against increasing the company's priv-ileges. Yet, despite these representa-

tions, the Government shortly before the elections issued an order-in-council the elections issued an order-in-council granting the extra privileges asked for. An interesting feature of the board's memorandum to the Government is that it appears to give the Government justification for jumping either way.

CREW NEARLY STARVED.

Exciting Marine Adventure at South-ampten Due to Bad Weather. Southampton, May 4.—The tug R. H. Dobson of Southampton, while endeavoring to make this port on Thursday last, struck fast in an ice floe about four miles from the harbor. A stiff breeze from the west, which has blown almost continuously for the past three almost continuously for the past three weeks, and which has rendered this harbor ice-bound until this late date,

harbor ice-bound until this late date, made escape for the unfortunate beat and her crew impossible.

Four days passed, then signals of distress were flown, and inquiry revealed the fact that the crew had taken but one day's provisions with them. Volunteer crews started with relief and provisions, but found it impossible to reach the boat. The Dominion Fish Co's tug, McIntosh, with a volunteer crew, made a final and successful effort to reach the tuff. The famished crew was supplied with sufficient provisions to last for some days yet. A stiff gale is blowing still, and there is no hope that the ice-bound boat may reach port for a few days.

GOING TO BROTHER'S, DIES.

Body Found in Barn After Two Weeks

Cornwall, May 4.—Quite a sensation was caused by the discovery of the somewhat decomposed body of a man in a barn near Summerstown station, ewned by D. D. McDonald. The body was identified as that of John McGahey, who had been an invalid in the Hotel Dieu, Cornwall, for some time, and who left for home two weeks ago. He left the train at Summerstown and, it is supposed, was walking to his brother's home when he was taken ill and sought refuge in the barn.
