another Financial Disaster Overtakes St. Thomas-Directors, After Consultation, Decide to Place Affairs in a Liquidator's Hands-Depositors Will be Paid in Full-Stock Speculation Again the Cause.

MANAGER A DEFAULTER.

ELGIN LOAN COMPANY CLOSES ITS DOORS.

St. Thomas, Ont., June 16.-A panic seized the people of St. Thomas when it became known that another loan company had sus pended and that the manager had disappeared. Shortly after 10 o'clock this notice was pasted on the doors of the Elgin Loan & Savings Com

of the Elgin Loan & Savings Company.—
"Owing to the absence of the manager, the directors have decided for the present to suspend payment for the purpose of investigating the affairs of the company."

It was a dreadful shock to a community just learning to bear the losses from the Atlas smash. It was doubly painful, because the manager, Mr. George Rowley, was regarded with such confidence that the Elgin was believed to be solid, and did not suffer any run, notwithstanding the collapse of the Atlas two weeks ago. According to the twenty-fourth annual report, issued on December 31st last, the position of the company them

report, issued on December 31st last, the position of the company them was:

Assets, value of mortgages and other securities, \$406,155.38; real estate, \$2,-425.25; cash on hand, Imperial Bank, \$20,103.73; loan companies, \$31,423.60; total, \$460,203.16.

Liabilities—To the depositors, \$10,3-00.95; to the shareholders, stock paid, \$239,058.51; reserve, \$20,000; balance by profit and loss account, \$7,316.70; total, \$460,203.16.

John Baird, President, stated that though there were two meetings of the board during the day they really did not know how they stood. "I am convinced, however," said he, "that the depositors will lose nothing, and I do not think the shareholders will lose much. The subscribed capital was \$625,000. Of this only 50 per cent. was called and about \$240,000 was paid in. The reserve and contingent funds amounted to \$27,000. If that will not meet the depositors' claims of \$103,000 we can call on the balance of subscribed capital of \$385,000, so that you see the depositors are absolutely safe."

Mr. Baird, "and we have been too
busy to look for him to-day. His
disappearance came as a thunder clap
to me this morning. I saw him last
on Friday, and arranged a meeting
with him for Saturday. In anticipation of a run I had taken \$65,000
of mortgages to Toronto and made
a large loan to meet any demands for
payment. He had not been well for
some time and sent word in the afternoon he was in a state of collapse.
I was out in the country on Sunday,
but called on him that eyening, and
was told that he could not see me. I
left word that I must see him this
morning, but about 8 o'elock his
daughter sent word not to expect him
until the afternoon.

"Shortly afterwards Mr. Wickett, the
lawyer, called and said that he was
afraid that Rowley had been
speculating with our funds. He
had tried to find out to
what extent, but could not. All
Rowley said was, 'My God, this is
awful.' That is all I know yet
about his affairs. It is certain now
that he was speculating with the
funds, but we do not know to what
extent."

"Could he have tampered with securities?"

"Oth, no; that would be impossi-

curities?"
"Oh, no; that would be impossible. He could not negotiate any mortgage without my signature and the company's seal, and I never signed any. Besides, as I said, I took the bundle of \$65,000 in mortgages to Toronto for a loan, and that was all right. Another bundle of \$12,000 is all right. The pigeonfoles do not right. Another bundle of \$17,000 is all right. The pigeoffioles do not appear disturbed. I believe that the securities, which are gilt-edged, are intact. From the little we have been able to discover so far. I do not believe his shortage can be over \$15,000 or \$20,000, and our surplus more than covers that."

"The directors yesterday decided to ask Judge Hughes to appoint a liquidator. Objection was made to a local man, and the Judge will appoint the London Trust Company. We thought that even it we came out without loss our credit would be injured, and it was better to wind in."

"What has Mr. Rowley to meet any shortage."

"He transferred his real estate to the company, but it, is heavily encumbered. He had, however, a guarantee bond of \$10,000."

Another cause for forebodings is that Mr. Baird says he did not know Mr. Rowley was speculating, the directors had taken the steps which would enable the company to do so. The Elgin office was a few doors from the Atlas, and Mr. Rowley was jealous of Mr. Wallace's success, frequently alluding to the money the latter was making. This, no doubt, accounted for the \$31,000 deposited there. The Elgin charter prevented it from speculating in stocks, but the directors succeeded in getting a bill through the Legislature at the present session removing such prohibition. Although it came into effect last week, it was not acted upon owing to the slump in the market. But the supposition is that Mr. Rowley had anticipated this bill, and speculated for many mouths past. It would he strange if he did not, when the speculative craze was in the air here. The directors of the Elgin Loan Company

are: John Baird, President; D. K. Mc-Kenzie, Vice-President; Angus Murray, John McCausland, A. W. Graham, Luke Millington and Albert Couse. They, like Mr. Baird, take a cheerful view of the outlook.

RIGHTS OF MUNICIPALITIES.

Objections to Clauses in Mr. Blair's Railway Bill.

Ottawa, June 16.—Substantial pro gress has been made with Government business after the private bills had been disposed of. The order for the House to go into committee upon the bill to incorporate the Toronto & Hamilton Railway Company stood over at the suggestion of the Minister of Railways, and will probably be the first business on the order paper for Wednesday evening. Mr. Paterson's bill to amend the customs act was

The House again went into committee on Mr. Blair's railway bill. In the evening Hon Mr. Blair moved to amend sec. 184 of the bill, which provides that "the railway shall not be carried upon, along nor across an existing highway until leave has been obtained from the board, as hereinafter provided," by making it read "the railway may be carried upon, along or across an existing highway on leave having been obtained from the board, as hereinafter provided."

Mr. E. F. Clarke inquired whether the clause would apply to electric railways declared for the general advantage of Canada.

Hon. Mr. Blair replied in the affirmative.

Mr. Clarke pointed out that a new condition of things obtained by reason of legislation now being sought, now Mr. Clarke pointed out that a new condition of things obtained by reason of legislation now being sought, under which whatever control is now enjoyed by municipalities over lines of tram cars was taken away from them. This was a serious matter for the municipalities, and he desired in view of its importance to draw the attention of the Minister to the necessity of amending the clause in order to preserve their rights.

Hon. Mr. Blair replied that the House could not be supposed, in considering this bill, to make provision for every special and exceptional situation. It was quite open to members, when companies come before the House for a charter, to declare whether or not the work was for the genal advantage of Canada, and also to lattach a declaration to the bill that

attach a declaration to the bill that the rights conferred upon the company should not be exercised in any city or town without the consent of the municipality. He asked Mr. Clarke to suggest an amendment to the section and added that the trop

Clarke to suggest an amendment to the section, and added that the tenor and spirit of the existing law had been preserved in the clause.
