"A GOOD HUMOR."

Historical Novel Is More Wholesome Than "Society" Novels Says Andrew Lang, English Author and Critic.

To me the recent revival of historical romance seems an excellent sign of the times. Not that it is overdone. Every success provokes imitation and reaction. Not that all historical novels are good, the reverse. Many are ignorant, imitative, and stupid to an extreme degree. Just as many novels in dialect and many novels of psychological analysis and many serious "sociological" novels are a weariness to the child of nature. But I like to see a boy or girl read almost any historical novel, for he or she has escaped out of the world that is too much with us and he or she may acquire a taste for history, "more instructive than novels and quite as amusing," said King James II., whose own history was of the gloomiest. Therefore, though there have been few new historical novels—how bad few know better than I—though many are imitations at fourth hand, though in others far too much blood is superfluously shed, still the tendency to the historical novel is "a good humor." The "Iliad" and "Odyssey" were practically the historical novels of Greece in verse, and what remains of the school is of undeniable merit. Much more wholesome is the historical novel than the "society" novel, now descending to the abysmal level of society journalism.—Andrew Lang.

Lady Donegall's Triple Romance.
Lady Donegall, who has rejoiced her octogenarian husband's heart by presenting him with a son and heir, is receiving a flood of congratulations from her friends in both England and Canada.

The Marquis of Donegall's life history is quite a romance. He has been three times married. His first bride was Lucy Elizabeth Virginia, daughter of Henry Holt Oliver, Western Priory, Somerset. The Marquis was then only Captain Chichester, a fine figure of a man, of stalwart carriage and handsome face, but very poor, and as poor in prospects as a sudden wheel put him in the possession of the Marquisate of Donegall, but little else, for the sporting and gambling proclivities of the early Chichesters had made inroads in their vast possessions, which had dwindled almost to the vanishing point. It was little the dashing young captain had to maintain the dignity of his new title upon.

Then followed an annulment of the marriage, from circumstances which have never been fully explained. But, in December, 1898, a miserable old woman, wearing dilapidated clothes and carrying a Bible under her arm, applied for admittance at Highgate Workhouse. The officials were incredulous when she described herself as the Marchioness of Donegall, but eventually she was found to be the Marquis' first wife. What become of the aged Marchioness is not known, but it is generally believed that she is now dead.

The Marquis in 1865 took a second wife, Mary Ann Williams, daughter of Edward Cobb, of Wright's Lane, Kensington. She died in 1901. The third Marchioness, who has assumed a direct succession to the title, has traveled a great deal in Russia and South Africa.

The Suez Canal.
No more complete refutation of the arguments used to defeat a great investment in canal construction was ever furnished than by the Suez canal, the report on whose traffic for the last year has been recently made public.

The big Suez ditch was opened to navigation Nov. 17, 1869. Its total length is ninety-two miles, from Port Said to Suez. Its actual cost was about \$38,000,000, besides a bond of about \$7,000,000 more. Its stock is divided into 400,000 shares, and of these 176,602 are held by the British Government, for which it paid the Khedive of Egypt in 1875 \$20,000,000, using round figures. The shares bear interest at 5 per cent. Up to 1872 the canal's running expenses exceeded its receipts. In that year it earned rather more than \$410,000. Yet its total receipts in that year (1903) were \$12,481,600 in excess of its expenditures, and it distributed in net profits after covering its sinking fund over \$12,000,000.

Its traffic is steadily growing. Last year the net tonnage of vessels using it was 11,248,413, an increase of 9 per cent since 1900.

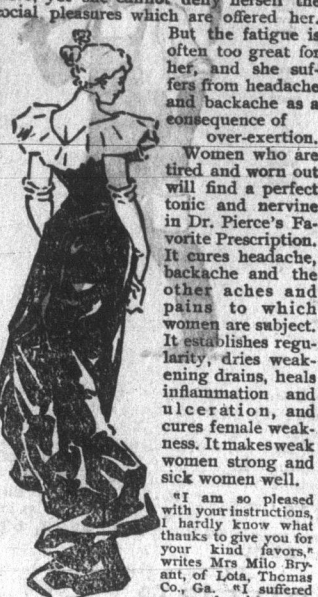
Circulation of the Bible.
In London and New York Bible societies, established for the circulation of the scriptures as a religious obligation and not for pecuniary profit, are issuing millions of Bibles. The British and Foreign Bible Society, founded in London one hundred years ago, has sent out during that period about 175,000,000 copies of the Bible in whole or in part in 363 languages and dialects; last year its issues were more than five millions, and nearly one-third of them were in the English language. The American Bible Society at New York, during its existence of about three-quarters of a century, has issued toward 75,000,000 Bibles and parts of the Bible of the New Testament, more especially. In Germany are numerous Bible societies and the aggregate number of Bibles annually distributed by them is great.

When the King Was Prince.

Henry Labouchere was once asked what he called the Prince of Wales, now King Edward, when he dined at Marlborough House. "Well," said Labby, "when the soup comes on I address him as 'your royal highness.' The fish often softens the remark, and as not I call him 'Wales,' while during the entrance and joint I get quite familiar, and he becomes 'Buddy,' while he slaps me on the back and dubs me 'Labby!'"

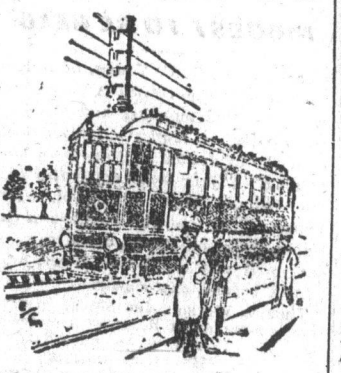
125.8 MILES AN HOUR

THE LATE EXPERIMENTS IN ELECTRIC TRACTION NEAR BERLIN.

How the Velocity of 125.8 Miles an Hour Was Attained—The Tracks and the Demon Car—New Motor for Long Distance Service—Built by German Government for Experimental Purposes.

As the crowning culmination of three years of plodding persistence and the expenditure of more than \$500,000, German engineers the other day realized their ambition to propel an electric railway train at the unparalleled speed of 125.8 miles an hour. The Marienfelde-Zossen electric line, over which this record breaking time was made, is eighteen miles in length and is owned and was built by the German Government primarily for experimental purposes. At the last session of the Reichstag 280,000 marks was voted to put it in perfect condition for the latest tests. When the experiments were begun under Imperial auspices over two years ago the feasibility of developing a speed of fifty miles an hour was one of the questions to be solved. A speed of nearly a hundred miles an hour was reached some months ago, when it was found that the roadbed and rails were not suited to higher speeds. A long interruption ensued to allow the road to be reconstructed. This was done along its entire eighteen miles of length. The seventy pound rails were changed for those of a hundred pounds in weight, and the road was rebalanced, and many ties sheathed with oak were substituted for those removed. In brief, the roadbed was made as solid and secure as human ingenuity could make it.

It is generally recognized among electricians that there is practically no limit to the speed at which a car may be propelled by electricity, the only trouble being to provide for it a safe track and make the car itself strong enough to withstand the ter-

rific friction. In providing the cars for these speed tests the same care in the matter of stability was exercised as in the preparation of the track.

The experiments are conducted jointly by the Siemens-Halske and the German General Electric Company, and for the trials each built especially designed cars, both being equipped with what are known as "three phase" motors—that is, three conductors supplying the current.

The car with which the last test was made, developing the phenomenal speed of 125.8 miles an hour, was of the Siemens-Halske build, having four motors, with a total of about 1,100 horse power. The current employed was between 13,000 and 14,000 volts, which was reduced by transformers to about 450 volts.

It is said that Emperor William is a silent partner in the Siemens-Halske firm of electricians and that he has contributed several million marks of his private fortune toward these experiments. However, this may be, it is known that the Emperor takes a very keen interest in them.

The attainment of a high rate of speed is, however, not the only purpose of the experiments of the German electricians. An important feature of the work is the development of appliances for the safest and most economical use of electricity in car propulsion.

While not directly connected with the Marienfelde-Zossen experiments, the impetus given by Government patronage and encouragement to electrical research and inquiry has produced a new motor which promises to be of great importance in the development of electric railway service. This is the invention of a young Austrian electrician and achieves what apparently entire success what has not been accomplished hitherto, at least not in Europe—viz, it propels the full sized service car at any desirable degree of speed without employing any cumbersome and expensive regulating devices, while deriving its energy from a single phase alternating current of 6,000 volts, carried along the line on one small trolley wire and delivered directly to the motor without conversion to a lower voltage or a continuous current.

The importance of this demonstration, which will be at once recognized by every electrical engineer, will be apparent when it is remembered that electric traction, which has proved so effective and economical for interurban and suburban service, has met hitherto some very serious economic difficulties when applied to long distances.

The new motor is believed to have overcome in a very great measure these obstacles and opened the way to economical and therefore practical long distance electric traction on railways of standard capacity.

On the whole, the German experiments both in the matter of speed development and the perfection of electric traction appliances are of the utmost importance to the world and are highly creditable to German genius and ingenuity.

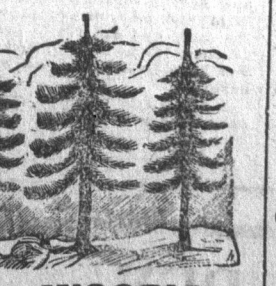

British Railway Accidents.

A Blue Book has been issued by the British Government giving returns of accidents and casualties as reported to the Board of Trade by the several railway companies in the United Kingdom, during the year ended December 31, 1902, together with reports of the inspecting officers of the railway department to the Board of Trade upon certain accidents which were inquired into. Accidents to trains, rolling stock, permanent way, etc., caused the death of 12 persons and injury to 854 persons. Of the 12 who lost their lives 6 were passengers and 4 servants of companies. Of the 854 persons injured 732 were passengers, 110 servants of companies, and 12 belonged to neither of these classes. In 1901, 11 persons were killed and 637 injured, but 1901 was noteworthy for the fact that in this year train accidents did not cause the death of a single person. Of the 641 persons killed and 2,094 injured by accidents from causes other than accidents to trains, rolling stock, permanent way, etc., of the 135 killed and 1,814 of the injured were passengers. While trespassing on the railways, 286 persons were killed and 116 injured, 135 persons committed suicide on railways, and 17 persons were injured while apparently attempting suicide. Accidents caused by the traveling of trains or the movement of vehicles used exclusively upon railways caused the death during the twelve months of 443 persons of companies and injury to 3,713 others. Of these, 15 were killed and 501 injured while coupling or uncoupling vehicles. Altogether, the number of persons killed on railways in the United Kingdom in the course of public traffic during 1902 was 1,096, and the number of persons injured 6,601. In addition to the above, the railway companies have reported to the Board of Trade accidents which occurred upon their premises, but in which the movement of vehicles used exclusively upon railways was not concerned, which brings the total number of personal accidents reported during the twelve months to 1,171 persons killed and 17,814 injured.—London Times.
