"It is with great ratisfaction that I have received from all forcien powers the strongest assurances of their fernish disposition, and of their cannest desire to cultivate and maintain with me the relations of amity and I rejoice in the prospect that I shall be able to premote the best interests of my subjects by securing to them the advantages of peace.

I haven that 'civil war still afflicts the kingdom of Span. I continue to exercise with fidelity the engagements of my Crown with the Queen of Spain, according to the stipulations of the Treaty Quadruple Alliance.

I have directed a Treaty of Commerce, which have concluded with the United Republic of Peru and Bolivia, to be laid before you, and I hope soon be able to communicate to you similar results of my negotiations with other powers.

I recommend to you serious consideration the state of the province of Lower Canada.
