NCRTHERN ONTARIO POWER
MAKING NEW ARRANGEMENTS.

Following the meeting of the fire and light committee of the town council of New Liskeard, Ont., and a representative of the Northern Ontario Light, Heat and Power Company, several new changes that were favorable to the citizens were submitted to the light committee by the company's representative.

The company is asking for a new franchise which will likely be voted on by the people on election day.

The proposed cut in rates submitted, does not take in power, but is for lighting alone.

At present users of electricity are paying 10 cents per kilowath hour net, the new rate proposed is 9 cents net, and doing away with the meter rentals which at present amount to three dollars per annum. No change is proposed in the arc lights, which cost the town \$55 per annum, and the cost of street incandescent lights will be the same but the company would substitute the 100 c.p. for the present 6 c.p. lamps. While the price would be the same the powers of the lights would be increased two-thirds.
