County Council.

County council meet last week in Warton. The council was treated to an excursion to Lion's Head on the boat. Warton managed to get a grant of one hundred dollars to build a lock-up.

As we are not likely to have the county council meeting in Mildmay, and not the remotest chance of a grant to assist us to build a lockup, we should depend on ourselves and proceed at once to build a lockup in Mildmay. It would be rarely needed for our own citizens but when we have any demonstration here that draws outsiders to our town, sometimes the knowledge that there is no lock up leads a few of our fast young neighbors to presume and cut up rather uproariously. An hour or two of silent meditation in a lockup for such gentry, would inspire them with more respect for the authorities, and would have a restraining influence on their conduct when out of reach of their parents. It is not altogether viciousness that leads young men, when away from home restraints, to cut up and annoy quiet, peace loving people by loud and blustering behavior but a sense of innate smartness common to young people, which prompts them to display their precocity in an offensive and disorderly manner. If our council will build a lockup and advise it well, these young bloods when they condescend to visit us would be more circumspect in their behavior and be more of a credit to themselves and to their parents and to the town from which they come.

Our county rate this year will be the lowest ever had in the county. Our debenture debt is now cancelled and we are free from county debt. The rate this year is one mill on the dollar of the equalized assessment and will require about one thousand dollars less from the township of Carrick than last year. We have reason to congratulate ourselves that the huge debenture debt of over half a million dollars has been wiped out. It has been a long pull of county buildings, gravel roads, and railway bonds.

The next expenditure will no doubt be a county Poor House. Now that the county is out of debt, after a short breathing spell, there will be a strong effort made to get a poor house and industrial farm.

If the united counties of Grey and Bruce could agree to build a union poor house, it would answer for both municipalities and save the expense of one set of officials. No doubt the government grant would be given to both counties and thus the extra expense of a large building would be covered by the extra four thousand dollar grant.

Christian Endeavor.

The Christian Endeavor Society met in the Methodist church on Tuesday night this week. The topic for the evening was "Faith in God, what is it and what it does."
