The president, Mrs. Lazier, presided. The secretary's report was read and adopted. The secretary read a letter from Miss Fum-Commisson, Moore Barracks, Shorncliffe, England, thanking the Association for the boxes sent in her care for the men in the trenches and also gave a list of the Bellevue men who had received them. Maurice, of Moore Barracks Hospital, Shorncliffe who had spent Christmas in an isolation hospital attending several of the Canadian soldiers who were either suffering or were expected to suffer from trench fever and how grateful she was to have the Christmas packages sent by our Association to distribute to them and how appreciative they were, and that we would have been simply paid for all our work if we had heard their expressions of gratitude. MOBILISING AGRICULTURAL SECURITIES

(Special to The Ontario)

Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Mar. 18, 1916.—Mobilising of farmers' securities was one of the measures advocated in a brilliant and valuable speech on the budget given by Nelson Ferguson, M.P., for Prince Edward County, who, from his first day in the Legislature, has shown the very keenest interest in everything relating to Agriculture, and who takes every possible opportunity to discuss the subject.

Mr. Ferguson maintained that the phenomenal crop of 1915 should not lead to any slackening of endeavour on the part of the Department of Agriculture to improve conditions; for the 1915 crop was mainly due to extraordinary climatic conditions which might not occur again.

On the question of Land Credits, which Mr. Ferguson listed under the heading of mobilising agricultural securities, he outlined what had been done in New South Wales, Denmark, and other progressive countries. He urged especially the co-operation of the Departments of Agriculture and Education, and said that if the farmers of Ontario and Canada were to take their place in the world's markets in the reconstruction period following the war, the problems of agriculture at home must be dealt with vigorously now.

Mr. Ferguson's speech was free from any political bias. He referred
