ROSSLAND A COMMON POINT. The enterprise of the American transcontinental railways, in making Rossland a common point, has forced the C. P. R. to follow suit. By this cut on the part of the southern roads, the C. P. R. is compelled to deliver freight from Eastern Canada and Pacific coast points at from \$4 to \$6 per ton cheaper than was previously the case.
