ROSSLAND A COMMON POINT.

The enterprise of the American transcontinental railways, in making Rossland a common point, has forced the C. P. R. to follow suit. By this cut on the part of the southern roads, the C.P.R. is compelled to deliver freight from Eastern Canada and Pacific coast points at from \$4 to \$6 per ton cheaper than was previously the case. The great reluctance of the C. P. R. to give Rossland the benefits she is entitled to in this respect is best shown in the fact that it has systematically bled the merchants of this city, and consequently the public, ever since it has had an opportunity to do so.
