The most striking demonstration of the effect of the war shown in the statement is the decrease of Germany's aux-Basques from Sydney until seven | \$48,072,784 consumption in November. leaving North Sydney. She landed year. For Belgium the decrease was from \$3,999,169 in 1913, to \$121,816 this year.

Imports from Germany did not show the same result. In 1913 the United States bought \$14,256,993 during November in the German markets, and in 1914, \$11,920,680 during the same month. During the eleven month period,
