Here's a puzzle. How can you divide a three cornered pennant among eight teams April 18?

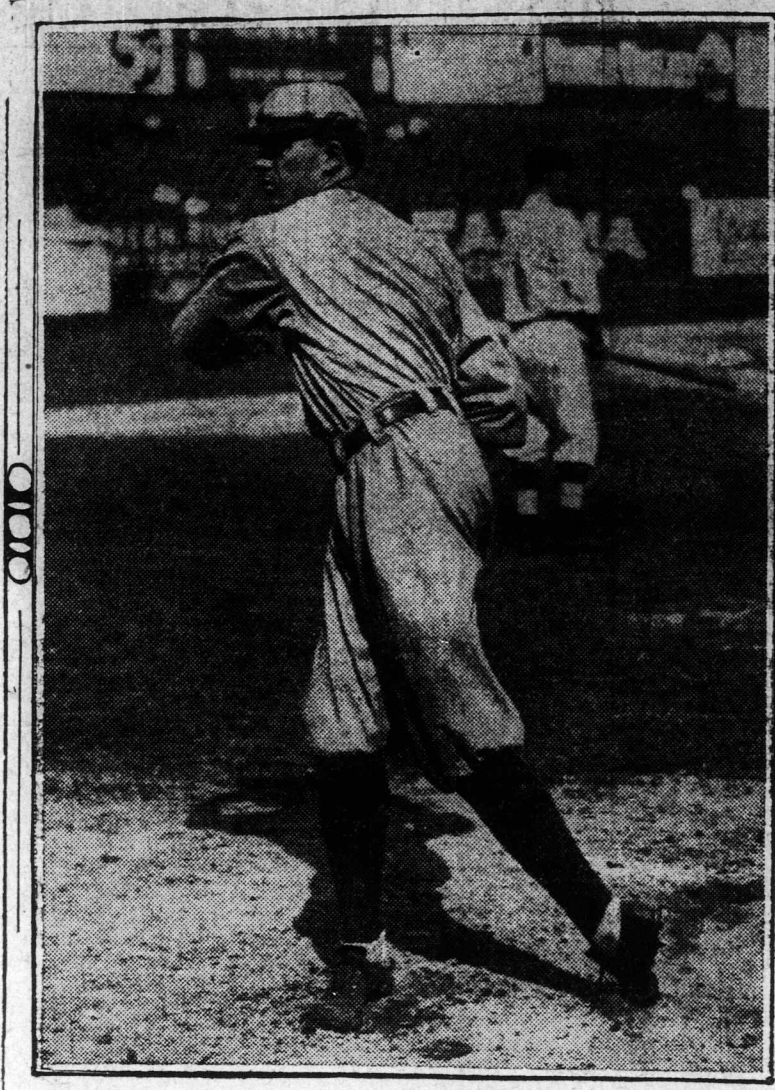
We hesitate very profoundly to pass opinion on any of the 1914 Red Sox until we have seen them under fire, also to have heard what the score was after a few games away from home.

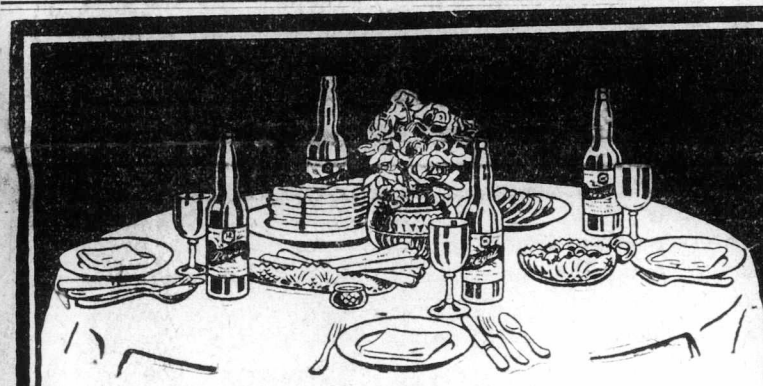

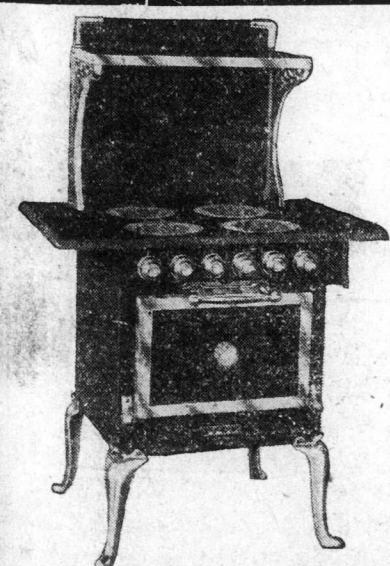
