THE BATTLESHIP KING EDWARD VII SUNK; ALL SAVED

Admiralty Announces Ship Finished March, 1905, Sunk by Mine.

London, Jan. 10.—The British battleship King Edward VII has been sunk after striking a mine. The entire crew was saved. The Admiralty announcement says: "H.M.S. King Edward VII has struck a mine, owing to the heavy sea she had to be abandoned and shortly afterwards, the ship's company was taken off without any loss of life. Only two men were injured."

GREEK COLONISTS IN FAVOR OF THE ALLIED CAUSE

Met in Paris and Urged Mother Country to Enter War.

Paris, Jan. 10.—The congress of Greek colonists abroad, attended by delegates from the United States, Canada, England, France, Russia, Switzerland and Roumania, met here today with Gregory Triantaphyllides presiding. After several discussions of the war situation, the congress resolved: "First, that the urgent question was that of securing respect for the constitutional liberties of Greece; second, that it was to the interest of Greece to abandon neutrality and join the allies; third, that the congress should not break up until this task was completed and that meanwhile power would be delegated to an executive committee charged with carrying out these decisions."

THREE MEN

Were Killed in Explosion at Powder Plant in

Philadelphia, Jan. 10.—Three men were killed and a number injured in an explosion of smokeless powder at an investigation of the superintendent of the plant said that three were dead and possibly four. The cause of the explosion is not known but according to the superintendent there is no suspicion that the blast was due to outside agencies. The report that arrests had been made was denied.

FIGHT AGAINST THE BAR-ROOMS NOT OVER, ONLY BEGUN

Says Rev. J. W. Gordon, of St. Andrew's Church, in a Sermon Yesterday.

Taking as his text the words, "Herod feared John," Rev. J. W. Gordon said: "Sin is always afraid of righteousness, because righteousness is never beaten. People have come to me during the past week and said, 'I am sorry we were beaten last Monday night. We were not beaten, and nobody knows it better than the liquor trade. A righteous cause is never beaten. We did not win all we set out to win, but we won a great deal. The vote last Monday says to the bar rooms of this city, we have been seen to be in the recent campaign. The liquor trade talks as if the fight is over, but they know it is not. They are afraid of the forces of righteousness in this city. Many are afraid of the vote of the farmers who are afraid of the recount and scrutiny which is coming. They are afraid of the provincial wide campaign which is now on. They are afraid of the vote of the farmers whom they said would avoid a dry Ontario. The local option workers know that their majority of one thousand has put heart into the entire province, and made it very clear that the cities of Ontario, with but a little assistance from the rural electorate, will vote Ontario dry at the next opportunity. Ottawa has cut off 37 licenses at the risk of dropping out of the big city class. The liquor trade knows this, and the bar room defenders of Brantford had better gather together another fund to begin another and more costly fight when every worker from the high salaried organizer and advertising agent down to the meanest ferret who sneaks in to houses under the guise of a recruiting agent, demands his cash."

Jury Locked Up

New York, Jan. 10.—The jury in the case of William Rockefeller and other former directors of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, charged with conspiracy to monopolize the railway traffic of New England in violation of the Sherman law failed to reach an agreement at one o'clock Friday night, having considered the evidence for nearly ten hours. The jury was locked up for the night at one.

Mentioned in Despatches There have not only been changes in the staff in Great Britain where Gen. Sir William Robertson becomes Chief of the Imperial Staff, but there have been changes in France as well. Gen. Edouard De Castelnau has been appointed Chief of Staff for the French army, a position second only to that occupied by Joffre. De Castelnau, like his chief, has added to his reputation during the war by excellent work. In the drive made into France in the early days of the war De Castelnau was entrusted with the task of holding back the Crown Prince and his satellites from Nancy. He performed his task so well that the failure of the Hun to break through at this point contributed in no small measure to their retirement from the gates of Paris. De Castelnau is a veteran of the War of 1870, and is generally regarded as one of the most competent generals in France. Lately he has been visiting the allied forces at Saloniki.

THE CONDITION

Of the Kaiser is Said to be Not Alarming.

Rome, Jan. 10.—The latest reports received here regarding the illness of the German Emperor minimize the danger of his condition and contradict wild rumors circulated not long ago. These reports received from Germany, through Switzerland, say that the Emperor is affected by a malignant growth in the throat, which required a small operation. Although the operation was slight, it is thought the greatest care was indispensable owing to the delicate nature of the organs affected. A high church official who undertook to secure this report was assured that the doctors believed that if the complications do not arise, a contingency they think unlikely, the Emperor will be able to resume work this month or early in February.

Safety lights are to be carried by Leeds parsons. Within the last few days two boys have been killed by motor cars in the streets, and in order to minimize the danger arising from the lighting restrictions the constables on point duty are to carry white and red lights—a white light in front, a red light behind.

This decision was reached after the members listened to an explanation of Lord Selborne's scheme to increase the food production of the country.
