Paris, May 22.—The battle of Verdun, the longest and most bitterly contested individual struggle of the war, enters on its fourth month today. The Germans, with characteristic stubbornness and patience, are hammering at Dead Man Hill, where the most furious and bloody fighting of the three months' conflict has taken place.
