War Bread Blueberry Jam Tea The recipes for Corn and Potato Loaf and Boiled Haddock, mentioned above, are as

Boiled Haddock-Wash and scale thoroughly wipe the inside, and fasten the tail in the mouth with a skewer. Put 2 oz. salt into 1-2 gal water and when it is dissolved put in the fish. Bring the water to a boil, remove the scum, then simmer gently (about 1-2 hour), until the flesh leaves the bones easily. Take it up as soon as it is sufficiently cooked or it will be hard and tasteless Garnish with parsley, and serve with melted butter.
