NOW A PROPHET

Carnegie Makes an Appeal to Emperor William of Germany to Form a Union.

St. Andrews' Scotland, .Oct. 23 .-Andrew Carnegie was to-day formally reinstalled as rector of St. Andrews university in the presence of a large and brilliant assen blage .over which

Principal Donaldson presided. The honorary degree of Doctor of Law was subsequently conferred on Carnegie, Ambassadors Choate and White, Prof, Alexander Graham Bell, of Washington, and Henry White, sec. retary of the United States embassy

in London Carnegie's rectorial address consisted of a lengthy study of the compara-tive growth of nations in the paths of industrial ascendency with a striking ommentary on their future.

In his speech which was replete with notable statistics and important economic prophesies perhaps the most remarkable feature was an appeal to If you are in need of treatment, we Emperor William to use his influence towards the eventual creation of the United States of Europe, under the Japan, would suffice to ensure a sat-

"The Czar," he continued, "having taken the first step toward the peace of the world in The Hague conference the other might emperor might some day be impressed with the thought that it is due to himself and to Germany to play a great part upon the wider stage of Europe as her deliverer from the incubus which oppresses and weakens her, the appalling, paralyzing fear of war and of ruin between members of her own body.'

PRAISED EMPEROR WILLIAM. Mr. Carnegie, in the course of a glowing tribute to Emperor William, said he could not help believing that one so supremely great" could "influence the few men who to-day control Europe to take the first step, not to federate, but by an alliance, to insure nternal peace, which is all that can be expected at present." Unless the powers agreed to something of the kind all they could look forward to was to "revolve like so many lillipatians around this giant Gulliver, the American union, soon to embrace 200,-000,000 of the English-speaking race and capable of supplying most of the

vorld's wants. For the best essays on this subject Carnegie offered a rector's prize. Dealing with the events which caused the industrial supremacy "once yours but now passed over to you lineal descendant, who bears the industrial crown," Carnegie maintained that it was a physical impossiblisty for Great Britain to produce material things rivaling in amount those of war of 1861, Mr. Kruger wished to countries the size of America, Ger-take no part whatever in the dispute many and Russia, nor would a union of the empire change the situation for "neither Canada "nor Australia gave promise of much increase in population or industrialism. hought of material ascendancy even with the British empire united must herefore be abandoned.'

Carnegie spared his Scotch audience no details. "America," he soid, "now makes more steel than all the rest of the world. In iron and coal her production is greatest and it is also so in textiles. She produces three-quarters of the world's cotton. The value of her manufactures is about triple that of your own. Her exports are greater and the clearing house exchanges at New York are almost double those of

Germany, the speaker also said, now threatened to oust Great Britain even from second place. France was not likely to increase her trade much further. It was only thanks to the frugality and virtue of her people that

she remainezd amongst the first-class

VALUE OF HOME MARKET. He emphasized the assertion that the most powerful weapon in conquering foreign markets is a profitable home market. "Invasion of Europe especially of Great Britain, by American manufacturers, are not to be apprehended to any considerable extent, except at rare intervals," be-cause the home market in America took 96 per cent of the manufactured articles, hence her prosperity. "Foreign commerce is a braggart always in evidence at home. Commerce is the true king." The work accom-plished in American commerce by "the German element can scarcely be be lieved, except by those who like my self know it by experience."

The sobriety and determination of the Germans formed an example for England, whose enormous drink bill and money spent on tobacco they cut in half, while the gambling of both masters and men was abolished. "The great secret of success in busines and in millionaire-making is to make pariners of valuable managers of de

partments. Mr. Carnegie described as a dark cloud on England's horizon the fact that "in 20 to 25 years the supply of Cleveland ironstone will be practi-cally exhausted. The Cumberland supply is already nearly exhausted. This will bring dearer iron and steel." "However," Mr. Carnegie added "even the United States has only a proved supply of first-class ore sufcien't for 60 or 70 years. With the reserve of inferior grades it might last another 30 years, unless the rate of consumption greatly increased. But the United States, with her enormous extent had good hopes of discovering

deposits now unknown."

In proof of his contention that it was hopeless to fight "magnitude in commercialism," Mr. Carnegie cited the supremacy of Germany in the speed of Atlantic liners and said (they were not paid half the subsidies re-ceived by the British lines. "It is the magritude of the 250,000,000 of pecple the German lines serve, which is Minard's Liniment Cures Burns, etc.

A Choice.

The panorama of one of the great lakes is spread before me, and a small section of its mighty traffic is pass-Toiling along at a fair rate of speed goes a powerful steam barge, towing two deep-laden schooners; be hind puffs a little high-pressure steam barge, making an awful fuss, but geing mighty slow and carrying mighty little. Overhauling this bunch comes a magnificent steel freighter, with rakish masts and funnel, quadruple expansion engines, a noiseless exhaust, and a mountain of water at her bow.

The little high-pressure steam barge is making more noise and spitting out more steam than either of her big neighbors, but she isn't carrying one quarter as much freight, she isn't carrying it as fast or as far or as economically. These three classes of steamers are

duplicated in all walks of human life. Some men are little, noisy, highpressure affairs. They do their work in an old-fashioned, and consequently expensive way. They puff sweat and make an awful fuss about it, and they, like the little high-pressure steam barge, usually make so little by it that they have to keep going long after they should have been able to lay up for good.


