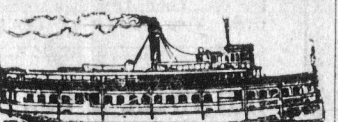

Legislator Expelled.

Boston, June 16.—The expulsion of Representative Frank G. Gethro of Boston from the Massachusetts House of Representatives recommended by the report made public yesterday by the House committee on rules which has been investigating charges of bribery during the present session. The committee also recommends that Representative Simon Swig of Taunton be censured.

Strikers Are Winning.

Toronto, June 16.—W. J. McGuire & Co., electrical contractors on the Traders' Bank Building, have agreed with the electrical workers at 35 cents per hour yesterday, and the 22 men go back on the job. The O'Connor Electric Co. have also signed the agreement, which leaves about 150 men still out.

Thirty Jews Killed.

Bialistok, Russia, June 16.—So far as can be ascertained thirty Jews were killed during Thursday's outbreak here. The hospitals are filled with wounded, but it is impossible to ascertain the correct number of the casualties, as many of the injured are hidden in private houses. All the Jewish shops on the four principal streets were sacked. Military and police patrols now guard the streets, and no civilians are allowed to leave their houses. A sort of truce has been established pending the complete restoration of order.

Flour Mills Burning.

Tula, European Russia, June 16.—The flour mills and grain warehouses here are burning.

Moscow.

Moscow, June 16.—The agitation among the workmen here is general, and the strike is in full progress. Largely attended meetings of a revolutionary character are held nightly in the industrial sections and big demonstrations are made in front of the prisons. In the resolutions adopted support is pledged to Parliament only so long as it persists in its fight against the bureaucracy.

Peasants Taking Lands.

Tver, Russia, June 16.—Cossacks and dragons have been despatched to two districts near here where the peasants, losing patience at the inaction of Parliament, are taking possession of lands.

Molotov, Russia, June 16.—The proprietor of an estate in the vicinity who refused to distribute his land to the peasants has been killed.

Novgorod, Russia, June 16.—Several proprietors of estates in this province have been beaten and driven off by the peasants.

Halifax is Ahead.

London, June 16.—(C. A. P.)—Col. Jocelyn, commandant of the School of Gunnery at Shoeburyness, in his report on the firing of the Royal Garrison Artillery, says of the companies abroad carrying out practice, the best was the 98th company, at Halifax, with an average of 549.

New Trial For Dreyfus.

Paris, June 16.—The Supreme Court yesterday began consideration of the results of the enquiry which has been going on for the past twenty-seven months relative to granting Alfred Dreyfus another trial. A decision is expected at the end of the month.

Divorce Is Refused.

Ottawa, June 16.—The bill granting divorce to Eileen Mary MacIntosh, wife of Charles St. Lawrence MacIntosh, of Ottawa, was thrown out by 18 to 18 against it in the private bills committee yesterday.

Trent Valley Boat Damaged.

Bobcaygeon, June 16.—The steamer Manita of the Trent Valley Navigation Co.'s line was badly damaged by fire yesterday morning, supposed to have originated from a spark from the boiler.

DEATH OF MINISTERS

Country's Rejoinder to Refusal to Abolish Death Penalty.

M. Alladin's Open Boast on the Rostrom—Russian Press is Profoundly Pessimistic Over Thursday's Events In Lower House of Parliament—Disorders Break Out With Greater Fury at Bialistok—30 Jews Killed.

St. Petersburg, June 16.—Disorders appear to have broken out at Bialistok yesterday afternoon with even greater fury than characterized Thursday's riots. No despatches were received last night regarding the anti-Jewish telegraph office is closed, but semi-official messages from Grodno and Minsk report that the excesses were started again yesterday by the throwing of several bombs. The crowds, according to the despatches, then opened fire on the police, which the troops replied to, and there was a constant interchange of shots between Jews from their houses and the soldiers from the streets.

A mob of peasants armed with clubs, scythes, etc., who had found their way into the city Thursday, was participating in the rioting.

Minister Interpolated.

M. Sheftel, a member of Parliament from the Jewish Pale, called on M. Stolypin, the Minister of the Interior, yesterday regarding the anti-Jewish outbreak at Bialistok. They were informed by his aide-de-camp that order had been restored, and that about ten persons had been killed, but that the Ministry had no information as to the number of wounded.

Subsequently M. Sheftel and his colleagues drafted interpellations for presentation in the Lower House demanding to know what measures are being taken to prevent the destruction of the lives and property of Jews throughout the empire.

M. Sheftel's interpellation was presented yesterday afternoon, and the House accepted it unanimously with amendments making it urgent and providing for the dispatch of a Parliamentary commission to Bialistok to investigate the affairs.

Hold Government Responsible.

A series of speakers held the Government directly responsible for the outbreak, declaring that the anti-Jewish hatred of the Russian masses was fanned, except when fomented by the authorities, and asserting that outbreaks never occurred except on their incitation or with their connivance.

The press is unanimous in its profound pessimism over Thursday's events in the Lower House of Parliament.

M. Alladin, leader of the peasant-workmen group, openly boasted from the rostrum Thursday that the death of the Ministers would be the country's rejoinder to the Government's refusal to abolish the death penalty.

Some of the speakers declared that Thursday's events definitely foreshadowed the Government's intention to dissolve Parliament. It is significant that The Novoe Vremya, hitherto a thick and thin supporter of the Government, is silent.

There is the milk grotto, in which Joseph and Mary are said to have concealed themselves before their flight into Egypt to escape the evil designs of Herod. The snowy whiteness of the soft chalk out of which it is hewn is ascribed to the spilling of a few drops of the Virgin's milk when she nursed the infant Jesus. Another grotto is pointed out as that in which St. Jerome for more than thirty years led the life of a hermit when bitter factional dissensions had forced him to leave Rome. On a western hill a rock strewn plateau, around which stately cypresses stand guard, marks a place where the ancient Hebrews brought their sacrifices unto the Lord. It is a solemn place, well fitted to excite devout thoughts—a place where a man might well keep communion with his Maker. In its broader features Bethlehem is almost unchanged since the days of David.
