Easter at St. John's Church.

The Good Friday and Holy Week services were well attended. On Easter Day a large number received Holy Communion at 8 a. m. and 11. The church was tastefully decorated with flowers and hangings. The rector preached in the morning on the 'Doubtful Victory over Death.' On Easter Monday the annual parish meeting was held in the church. The rector read his annual statement regarding the work of the parish. The financial statement, which was very satisfactory, was read by Mr. G. A. Prat, and after some discussion was on motion received and ordered to be printed and distributed to the congregation. Mr. Geo. A. Prat was re-elected warden. Mr. H. Troyte-Bullock having declined re-election, Mr. J. D. Sherward was elected. Messrs. H. Troyte-Bullock and W. H. Evans were elected delegates to the Synod with Messrs. R. W. Storms and T. L. Harvey as substitutes. The following gentlemen were placed on the vestry: Messrs. Troyte-Bullock, Wm. Gow, H. D'Alemain and R. W. Storms. It was resolved on motion of Mr. R. W. Storms that the rector and the warden be appointed a committee to purchase a 'positive organ.' A motion of thanks to the retiring wardens, Mr. H. Troyte-Bullock was passed by a standing vote, in putting the vote the rector spoke of Mr. Bullock's many acts of generosity to the church which were heartily concurred in by all present. The meeting closed with the benediction from the rector.
