Destroyers of Children. All parents know that certain angers beset the child-life. The houghtful have much parental solice and as a confully parental solice.

thoughtful have much parental solicitude, and as carefully as possible, by talking and watch care, guard their children against the things which threaten their welfare. There are, however, dangers which are appreciated by comparatively few parents. They are of the most insidious and rainous kind. There is, for example, the drink habit. Farents who, by precept and example, have well taught their children the wrong and danger of strong drink, may be wholly unaware of the acductive means which, for greed of gain, the enemies of virtue employ to lure their unauspecting victims. The people of the liquor traffic spread their nets for the young. These are found among the boys and girls, and the recruiting process begins when they are very young. It has been stated on good authority, that one of the things considered by a meeting of liquor manufacturers and sellers not very long ago, was how to replenish the ranks of the drinkers. The result of the conference was a recommendation to the keepers of saloons to be very pleasant with the boys, offering them familiar with the drink custom of the places of sale, and giving them also an impression that the drink sellers are pleasant and generous men. The small expenditure involved in this would, it was argued, bring a large and profitable return when the boys tusn streed had becomer galar customers of their bars.

Very recently it was discovered that in Montreal and Toronto, certain dealers in confectionery were selling chocolate drops filled with brandy and whiskey syrups. They were fined for selling liquors without license. But if they sold these candies with a full knowledge of their character and probable effects, their conduct deserved severer penalty. It is deplorable that, where the liquor traffic is concerned, efficials and others are so ready to overlook the most vicious acts. And this is because so many citizens fail to appreciate the real character of the liquor traffic and them men engaged in it. Parents do not wisely to defined themselves that only in Montreal and Toronto are brandy and whiskey charged candies sold. They are probably sold in many other places, and all who have the welfare of the young at heart would-do well to be watchful as to the appearance of this and other enticements to indugence in strong drink.

Another great danger of the young is the literature that is distributed amongst them. Mr. Anthony Comstock, the agent of the Society for thirty, yens in this most difficult work, whose report is now being published in the Sunday School Times, has again and again given evidence of the wide circulation of victious literature amongst the young. He has deatroyed over forty-three tons of vile books, 28, 425 pounds of stereotype plates for printing such books, more pictures and 12,045 regatives for printing such pictures. And this is sonly part of the work in the endeavor to check these abominable crimes.
