
Speech Delivered by Him in 1918 is Worth Reading Today

The following speech delivered before the Liberal Convention at Ottawa in 1918 by Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, at that time Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick:

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen, in discussing the subject matter of this resolution as it is submitted to you this morning, I may say that the subject is of much importance that it can hardly be expected that the mover or the seconder in the time that is allotted would be enabled to bring out all of its features, but I believe that the question is one of the most important that has been submitted to this convention. Eloquent references have been made to the fact by the speakers who have preceeded me that we have just emerged from this tremendous war and that our boys, who have made sacrifices shoulder to shoulder with the allied forces, victory.
