

## OUR FISHERIES

(Continued from second page)

12th. That in exchange for the said privilege that the time for setting nets be limited from the 15th of May till the 20th of July instead of the 1st of May till the 31st of July.

13th. That this association is of the opinion that a number of our rivers are not sufficiently guarded.

14th. That when the leases of the river will be renewed that the Government do insert as one of the clauses of the lease that a certain number of guardians should be kept or by the parties leasing the river, the number to be determined by the government upon the reports of its officers.

15th. That this association is of the opinion that the Government in addition to the guardians appointed by the club should also appoint at least one guardian on each river to see that the other guardians appointed by the club carry out their duty as it is to the knowledge of this association that many of the present guardians on some of the rivers do protect their friends who wish to approach and break the law.

16th. That this committee strongly urges that the Government use great discretion when granting licenses in or near the channels of any rivers.

17th. That if any nets exist at the present time in or near the channel of any river and which would prevent the salmon from getting up the river to spawn, that the said nets should be removed and the parties owning the same should be granted licenses elsewhere, as the setting of the nets in the channels of the rivers is one of the great dangers to the salmon industry.

18th. That the committee do now report progress to the Association.

The Grand Caspasia committee reported as follows:

Whereas during six years previous to the year 1898 we the undersigned obtained our official license from the federal Government of Canada, with the understanding that we would retain our said licenses in the future, on that consideration we then leased our rights to certain American gentlemen for a certain remuneration but under a guarantee from the federal Government that our licenses would still continue, after the transfer of our fishery right from the federal Government to the provincial Government, our respective licenses were then cancelled through our loss and detriment.

The most of these licenses were held by us and our ancestors from upwards of one hundred years on which we were paying a yearly license since the year 1860.

We wish also to state and to show that our ancestors were Loyalists, and obtained the above privileges and rights from the Crown for their maintenance.

That at nine o'clock all the fishermen being assembled the reports of the various committees were fully gone into and explained by Mr. Kelly and they were all unanimously adopted.

The meeting having discussed the advantages of being incorporated for the protection of the salmon all the fishermen present signed the petition of incorporation and the sum of Forty some dollars were then and there subscribed to help defray the cost of the same.

The name adopted for the fishermen's association was "The Baie des Chaleurs Salmon Net Fishermen's Association."

Provision was also made in the petition for incorporation to admit the fishermen of the County of Gaspé who would come to join their brother fishermen of the County of Bonaventure for the protection of the salmon industry.

Mr. F. X. Chénard was appointed President of the Association, and Mr. Edgar Cyr, Provisional Secretary, and Mr. Simon Poirier, Provisional Treasurer.

The following gentlemen were appointed Provisional Directors.—Louis Bujold, Edouard Arseneau, Fergus McPherson, J. B. Chapados, Bernard Degraze, Thomas Baillie, Sandy McKillop, J. P. Henderson, and Joseph Duncan.

The Local Government of the Province of Quebec were represented at the meeting by Mr. Hector Caron, General Superintendent of Fisheries of the Province.

Mr. Hector Caron addressed the meeting fully going into the merits of the question and assured the fishermen that the Government would do all in their power to render justice to their claim.

Mr. Kelly also explained that Honorable Mr. Prevost and the Provincial Ministers at Quebec were always ready to receive any just claim that would be put forth by the people, and that he felt confident that when the report of this meeting would be reported to Honorable Mr. Prevost the same justice that had actuated his movements in the past when dealing with the settlers would also continue to actuate his actions in the future, he also stated that Mr. Prevost was very highly impressed with his trip throughout the County of Bonaventure this summer and that he intended to come back again next summer and would be pleased to meet the fishermen at their next general meeting.

The following vote of thanks were then moved and carried:—  
Mr. Honorable Mr. Prevost:—  
That the salmon net fishermen of the County of Bonaventure appreciated the kind attention that the Honorable Minister of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries of the Province of Quebec has extended to the fisherman of the County of Bonaventure in suspending the proposed tariff for last year and for having sent the General Superintendent of Fisheries to meet the salmon net fishermen in order to discuss various questions which relate to their interests.

To Mr. Charles Maréchal:—  
This association do thank Mr. Maréchal for his kind support given to Mr. Kelly so far in connection with the salmon net question and that he be kindly asked to continue his kind efforts in that direction in the future, and that this association is exceedingly grateful to him for what he has done for them so far.

To Honorable Rodolphe Lemieux:—  
That this association, highly appreciates the kind efforts of the Honorable Minister of the Postal Department of the Dominion of Canada for his hearty co-operation and sympathy with the fishermen of the County of Bonaventure.

To Doctor Lemieux, Member of the Local Legislature for the Province of Quebec, for his kind support in helping Mr. Kelly to prevent the going into effect of the tariff last year which would have also effected the salmon net fishermen of the County of Gaspé.

To Mr. C. R. Scies, General Manager of the Atlantic & Lake Superior Railway Company, for having granted the salmon net fishermen such a low rate of \$1. for a return ticket from Metapedia to New Carlisle. That this low rate having been granted it enabled all the fishermen to be present at the meeting, and had it not been for the

kind attention of Mr. Scies in this respect that many of the fishermen would not have been able to attend this meeting.

A vote of thanks was also granted to Mr. Kelly for his efforts in behalf of the fishermen, which met with the unanimous gratitude of every fisherman of the County of Bonaventure.

A vote of thanks was also granted to Mr. Hector Caron, representing the Minister of Fisheries for the kind attention that he has given to the deliberations of this meeting and for the kind words that he had addressed to the fishermen before the meeting closed.

The meeting then adjourned.

### INTERESTING LETTER FROM THE WEST

Wabeno, Wis., Jan. 6, 1907.  
Perhaps a short letter will be interesting to the readers of the Advocate, regarding this great country of ours, as we Americans are always patting ourselves on the back and preaching that we have the greatest government under the sun. It is well for the country that the people are patriotic enough to think so. I actually believe, for crime, murders and the like, that the U. S. beats any civilized country on the globe, with the possible exception of Russia. Here is Chicago's table of crime, compiled by Attorney McKenzie Cleland, taken from the police records:—

A street disturbance every six seconds.

An arrest by the police every seven and a half minutes.

An arrest for drunkenness every fifteen minutes.

An assault and battery case every 27 minutes.

A new larceny case every 20 minutes.

A burglary every three hours.

A hold up every six hours.

Two suicides each day.

One murder each day.

During the year just ended there were 80 suicides in the city of Minneapolis, Minn.
