Escapes Death at Glasgow.


Montreal, March 13.—A private cable sent here fo-day stated that Major G. W. Stephens narrowly escaped death at Glasgow vesterday. It appears Mr. Stephens, Chairman of the Montreal Harbor Board, who is at present in Great Britain inspecting harbors in the interest of the port of Montreal, was, with a party of six others, on board of a small steamer. The vessel, going at full speed, ran into an unseen hawser stretched across the basin. The hawser swent the decks of the little steamer clear of its passengers, masts and steering gear.

Major Stephens was at the time of the accident standing in the bow of the vessel, and together with the whole party was knocked down with terrific force. The cable says that Major Stephens' escape from fatal injury was almost miraculous and that his present condition is satisfactory.
