Trouble In Fixing Payments For the Old Members.

(Special Despatch to the Times.) Toronto, Ont., June 18 .- The Independent Foresters this morning received the report of the Rate Committee which rithout making any recommendation, laid before the Supreme Court three different propositions for discussion. The different propositions for discussion. The first proposition and the one likely to be adopted is re-rating at the age of entry. The second proposition, that of Supreme Chief Ranger Stevenson, is a new rate to be paid in future, being a combination of the present rate at age of the entry with the rate at the attained age of the member. The third proposition is the adoption of the strict acturial rates on National Fraternal Corgress basis for old and new members. ial rates on National Fraternal Cor-gress basis for old and new members. The committee, while making no recommendation, criticises the first proposi-tion, and says that the payment of back dues by members may yet be ne-

back dues by members may yet be necessary.

The report says the vice of the proposition to re-rate at the age of entry is
more apparent where the duration of
membership is longer, thus the member
who entered twenty years ago at the
age of 40 has been paying \$10.03 per annum into the mortuary fund. In the
