The First Pope.

INTERESTING LETTER BY MR. CAPEL.

Monseigneur Capel lectured recently in
Pittsburg, Pa., before a very large audi-
ence. The distinguished prelate said:

"There are certain questions of so
great importance that the man who treats
them must feel that he is not only respon-
sible to God, but also to the world, and
that he is not only responsible for his
own soul, but also for the souls of others.
I feel this way when I start out to speak on
this subject. The First Pope and the
Second Pope are both familiar with the
world's people, we meet it nearly
everyday. And yet what different ideas
rise up in persons' minds when the word
is mentioned. To the Catholic ear, the word
suggests one thought, to the Protestant
an almost entirely opposite one, and to
the indifferent man a confused one.
Hence it is necessary to see what I mean
when I speak of the First Pope and the
Second Pope. One realizes in the
Pope the head of one of the oldest and
largest organizations of the world, of one
who is ruler and source of authority of
200,000,000 people scattered in every
land and in every clime. I would com-
pare him to the commander-in-chief of an
army. The latter commands all the
soldiers in his force, either directly or
indirectly, through his officers, and he is
responsible for the conduct of every
soldier. The Pope is the ruler of them all, either di-
rectly or indirectly through those whom
he appoints. Yet while this broad state-
ment is true, we have to restrict it by
saying that the Pope governs and rules
these 200,000,000 people in things spiri-
tual. With our temporal affairs he has
nothing to do, with our wealth he has
nothing to do, with our property he has
nothing to do, with our honor he has
nothing to do, with our life he has
nothing to do, with our death he has
nothing to do, with our resurrection he
has nothing to do, with our judgment he
has nothing to do, with our punishment he
has nothing to do, with our reward he
has nothing to do, with our salvation he
has nothing to do, with our damnation he
has nothing to do, with our heaven he
has nothing to do, with our hell he has
nothing to do, with our God he has
nothing to do, with our Father he has
nothing to do, with our Lord he has
nothing to do, with our Saviour he has
nothing to do, with our Holy Spirit he
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
