Rushing Out Of Church

How many of us have often reflected, with sentiments similar to those which follow, on the haste with which many Catholics leave the Church at or before the end of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass?

It certainly is a strange thing that so many Catholics who are sufficiently true to their religion to hear Mass every Sunday, find it necessary to rush out of church immediately after the last Gospel and before the brief prayers following the last Gospel are said—these brief prayers being offered by force of a Papal Decree for Holy Church and all the faithful.

Prayers with such noble and universal intentions, and in which it takes not more than two minutes to join, would certainly seem valuable and beautiful enough to make any Catholic feel that it is not only a duty but a privilege and a joy to hear them and to respond to them. And yet not a few worshippers at every Low Mass on every Sunday will hasten to rise and run out before these prayers are offered. Why? What excuse is there for their hurry? None, the world, and rarely does one find sufficient respect paid to the celebration of the Mass by the congregation to stand quietly and permit him to leave the sanctuary before the noisy rush to the exits begins.

It is not so much a want of faith as a want of thought that is responsible for this unbecoming conduct in the House of God. Think it over and mend your practice.

Art and Science in Toys

While the making of toys is an art that is practically, as old as the world itself, it has been only within recent years that science has bothered itself about them. Less than half a century ago they were regarded merely as playthings—amusing diversions for children that were by no means necessary to their well-being. Today, however, science

is that there is a well-defined philosophy underlying the use of toys; that they are the tool with which the little ones ply their trade; the paraphernalia necessary to the proper conduct of their society—that dolls, for example, are more to them than the associates that help to entertain them, in that they aid them in the attainment of their mental growth by stimulating the natural emotions which must be experienced in later life.

Whether this theory of the scientists is correct or not, the fact remains that children have always had the playthings requisite for their imitations of the domestic life and business affairs of older people; that they have always required their elders to provide them with such inventions and that, when they could not obtain these toys by any other means they themselves have sought and found objects that might be made to suit their purposes. Even the Middle Ages did not put an end to their pastimes. The toys in which they found diversion may have been more simple, but as they met the demands of nature they played their allotted part in the scheme of human development.

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Doing Good Badly

Beneath a bluff exterior he hid a kindly heart. How often have we seen this statement about some well-known man of business, some banker, some employer of thousands?

But why, if he possessed so kind a heart, did he disguise and even nullify his charitable tendencies by doing his good badly? Why, if he sought to bring happiness to his fellow-men, did he do it in a manner that he should continually cancel out his own achievements? If so, why interest himself in doing good at all?

To a hungry man a seven-course dinner paid for with a small brings much less pleasure than a small gift with a smile. Only a quick in the brain permits a man to enjoy the commission of a kindly act when he knows that his manner and his attitude bring disappointment and humiliation to the person he is trying to befriend.

Life is not long. We do not all get many opportunities to do material good to others. Why, if a man is impelled to courtesy and kindness, should he not so frame it that the beneficiary will get the fullest possible measure of happiness from it?

Lloyd George

Master Of Men

When Mr. Andrew Bonar Law reappraised in the Commons to give his benediction to Irish freedom and Lord Birkenhead replied to Lord Carson in the Lords, there must have been many a Die-hard who thought that Old England had gone mad.

For Bonar Law and Birkenhead as defenders of an Irish settlement represent one of the strangest developments in British political annals. One has but to glance back to the bitter days of 1913, when Redmond, Asquith and Lloyd George were battling for Home Rule, to realize the depth of the change. Mr. Bonar Law and Lord Birkenhead were then in the forefront of the anti-Home Rule battle. Mr. Law, leader of the Unionist Opposition, openly preached physical resistance; Lord Birkenhead, then Mr. F. E. Smith, was the most vindictive of the advocates of Ulster. Sir Edward Carson, chief lieutenant, known as "Gallagher" Smith, was one of the authors of the Ulster Covenant, a soldier in the Northern Volunteers raised to resist Home Rule to the death.

And now, eight years later, what a change! Mr. Law, older in years and experience, rises in the Commons to give his sanction to an Irish Bill ten times more drastic than that which he formerly opposed; and Lord Birkenhead, in the Lords, repudiates his old Ulster chief. Not even Mr. Gladstone, who from being the rising hope of the Tories became a prophet of Liberalism, or Mr. Chamberlain, who, from being the darling of the Radicals became a pillar of Unionism, afforded an example of such a profound change.

Nor is that all. Ten years ago names to conjure with in the resistance of Ulster were those of George Carson and Austen Chamberlain. Today, Mr. Chamberlain, now leading the party which his father founded—a party reared upon resistance to Home Rule—defends an Irish settlement in the Commons; and Lord Carson brilliantly champions the Unionist cause.

What is the explanation of the change? First of all, perhaps, the war, which tore many old beliefs and prejudices from their moorings, and to some extent the patriotism which at all times and in all countries has caused statesmen to put country before party, but largely too, and perhaps the greatest factor of all, the power and the persuasive personality of David Lloyd George. Mr. George accomplished what most observers thought impossible; he took the Irish question out of politics which had been its Nemesis since the days of Gladstone, and won all parties to its support. It was a task for a superman, a task for a man of genius in the management of men and affairs, a task perhaps which no one man in the British Empire outside of Lloyd George himself could have achieved.

And tomorrow, should Ireland ratify the Treaty of Peace, the Empire and the world will hail Lloyd George as the mightiest figure of his time. The war was the sepulchre of great reputations. Clemenceau, Orlando, Wilson, Asquith—all have crossed the stage and disappeared. But while other leaders have vanished the "Little Napoleon" of Wales bestrides his time as a political Colossus, marching from triumph to triumph, riding the tempest, confuting his foes, and now crowning a dazzling career by the finest victory of all.

Well may the Empire doff its hat to David Lloyd George as the man who "weathered the storm."
