The New Treaty.

A feeling of relief will be felt throughout the English speaking world at the modification yesterday of the Anglo-Japanese treaty of 1905. Much anxiety has prevailed since that time owing to the possibility of the obligations of that treaty involving Great Britain in war with the United States, and especially was this the case during the Japanese trouble in California, and no part of the British world would have been more exposed to the rigors of such a war than Canada and Newfoundland.

After the Chinese-Japanese war, and during the time that Russia was pursuing an aggressive policy in the Far East, a treaty was made between Great Britain and Japan. Its date was January 30th, 1902. It had special reference to the special interests of Great Britain in China and Korea. Its chief operative articles were two and three. Article II. provided that the other should remain neutral if either was engaged in war with one power in defence of its own interests, and should use its efforts to prevent other powers from joining in hostilities against its ally. Under Article III. if one or more other powers did so join, then the ally was bound to come to its assistance and conduct a war in common.

While the treaty was in force, war ensued between Japan and Russia, and Great Britain abided by its obligation. A new treaty was however signed on August 12th, 1905, which was subject to a special provision maintaining the statu quo in regard to the hostilities then raging. This was provided in Article VI, which was worded as follows:

"Art. VI.—As regards the present war between Japan and Russia, Great Britain will continue to maintain strict neutrality unless some other Power or Powers should join in hostilities against Japan, in which case Great Britain will come to the assistance of Japan, and will conduct the war in common, and make peace in mutual agreement with Japan."

The operative force of Article VI. ceased of course on the termination of the hostilities in 1906. This left the new features of the new treaty in full force and effect. One new feature was the inclusion of India and what concerns the Indian frontier as within the purview of the treaty. The principal change was the elimination of neutrality if one ally was at war with one or more Powers in regard to interests either in the Far East or India, and the substitution of armed assistance and war in common. In other words, Japan would call on Great Britain for assistance if any Power attacked or menaced her interests or territory in the Far East, and Great Britain could call upon Japan for armed assistance if any Power menaced or attacked India or its frontier or her other interests in the Far East.

Put in another way, if the States attacked or menaced Japan in the Far East, Great Britain was under obligation to make war on the States. The new version signed yesterday excludes from the purview of the treaty any Power which has a treaty to substitute arbitration for war with either of the allies. As such a treaty will in all probability be in full force in the immediate future between Great Britain and America, the danger of war collision between the two latter will be eliminated. If the Arbitration Treaty falls through, then the danger will remain.

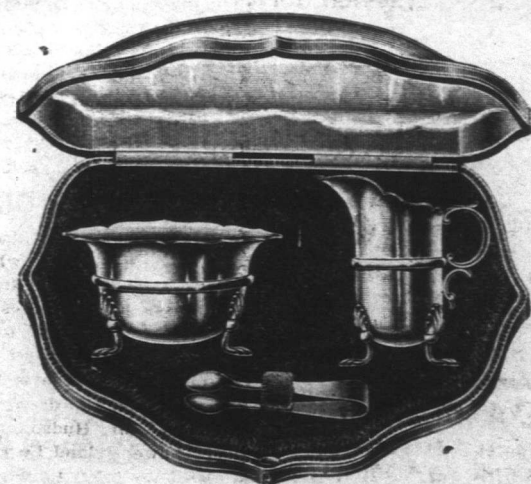
