### Her Three Sons Killed.

Survivor of Lusitania Disaster Receives Sad News on Landing in New York.

New York, Aug. 17.—An interesting story of a mother's part in the European war was told by Mrs. Phoebe Amory, of Toronto, who arrived from Liverpool yesterday on the Orduna.

Mrs. Amory has four sons in the British army, and expects her fifth, who is married and an engineer on the Canadian Pacific Railway, will respond to the call to arms as soon as she reaches her Canadian home.

When Mrs. Amory stepped from the deck of the Orduna she received a communication which informed her that her three boys had been killed in the fighting in the Dardanelles. Her eyes filled, but she smiled through her tears, and declared that while they were all fine young men, they could not have died in a better cause.

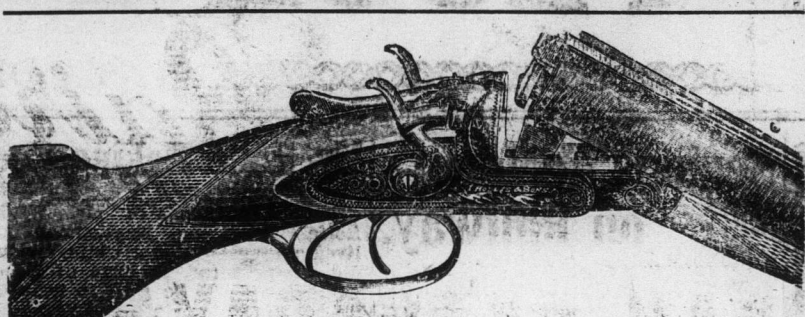
