TO-DAY'S Messages.**11.00 A.M.****A COLORED BATTALION.**

MONTREAL, To-Day.—Authority to organize a No. 2 construction battalion C. E. F., to be composed entirely of colored men with the exception of its officers, who will be white men, was received to-day. Lieut.-Col. Sutherland, railway contractor, a graduate of McGill, will command the colored battalion.

THE END OF THE JUTLAND BATTLE.

LONDON, To-Day.—Concluding his account of the battle of Jutland, Admiral Jellicoe wrote: "At daylight on the first of June his battle fleet, being southward of Horn Reef, turned northward in search of enemy vessels for the purpose of collecting our own cruisers and torpedo boat destroyers. The visibility early on the first of June was 2 to 4 miles less than on May 31. The torpedo boat destroyers, being out of visual touch, did not rejoin the fleet until 9 a.m. The British fleet remained in the proximity of the battle field near the line of approach to German ports until 11 a.m., in spite of the disadvantage of long distances from the fleet bases and the danger incurred in waters adjacent to the enemy's coast from submarine and torpedo craft. The enemy, however, made no sign and I was reluctantly compelled to the conclusion that the high sea fleet had returned into port. Subsequent events proved this assumption to be correct. Our position must have been known to the enemy at 4 a.m. the fleet engaged a Zeppelin for about 5 minutes, during which she had ample opportunity to note and subsequently to report the position, and course of the British fleet. The fleet was fuelled and replenished with ammunition and at 9.30 p.m. on the second day of June reported itself ready for further action."

GERMANS HELD BACK.

PARIS, To-Day.—Violent counter attacks by the Germans on the French lines on both banks of the Somme were repulsed with heavy losses to the attackers, according to an official statement issued by the French.

WITH THE BRITISH.

LONDON, To-Day.—A British official statement issued at midnight reads: As a result of violent bomb fighting we made further progress at certain points of the main battle area. Low clouds interfered with aeroplane work, but in Papamote area one of our machines dropping 300 feet successfully bombed a train from which German reinforcements were alighting. In another area the British heavy batteries secured direct hits on a German battery and a battalion in column, inflicting heavy casualties. In other parts of our line the situation is unchanged. Later details of the raid made by the Royal Welsh Fusiliers show that three enemy mine shafts were destroyed and that including 43 prisoners brought back the enemy suffered about 150 casualties.

ALLIED STRATEGY EFFECTIVE.

LONDON, To-Day.—The results of the staff conferences of the Allies at London in May and June are becoming continually more apparent. The co-ordination of the Allied attacks on the Teutonic forces indicates evidence that the initiative

12.30 P.M.**TERMS OF RUSSO-JAPANESE CONVENTION.**

TOKIO, To-Day.—The Japanese Foreign Office to-day announced as the substance of the Russo-Japanese Convention: First, Japan will take part in no arrangement or political combination directed against Russia; Russia will take part in no arrangement or political combination directed against Japan. Second, in case any territorial rights or special interests in the far east of one of the contracting parties, which are recognized by the other contracting party, are menaced, Japan and Russia will consult with each other on the means to adopt with a view to supporting or extending assistance for the safeguarding and defence of these rights and interests.

QUIET ON THE SOMME.

PARIS, To-Day.—Quiet prevailed last night on both sides of the Somme River, says to-day's War Office statement. The artillery of both sides was active on the left and right banks of the Meuse, especially on the Thiaumont earthwork and in the Fleury and Chemin des Dames. A small German attack on the French trenches at Lapretere Wood, failed. German aeroplanes yesterday dropped bombs on the open town of Laire, killing 11 persons, all of whom except one were women or children. Two German machines were brought down near Meslères.

MIGHTY RUSSIA.

LONDON, To-Day.—The Russians have begun a tremendous offensive on the Riga front where their artillery is destroying the German trenches, says a despatch from Vienna. The bombardment, the despatch adds, lasted 24 hours, and the Germans were helpless before the Russian artillery, which can now fire 50 shells as against one in 1914.

1.00 P.M.**GERMANS SINK FISHING BOATS.**

LONDON, To-Day.—Five more British fishing boats have been sunk in the North Sea by German submarines. In one case a fishing boat which tried to escape was shelled; one member of the crew was killed and three injured.

Pilot Missing.**DRIFTED OFF TO SEA.**

Last midnight Messrs. Fred Lewis and Edward Malone, Master Pilots, of No. 1, went out to take in the S.S. V. which was here from Spinnaker with a cargo of coal. On reaching the steamer in the narrow Malone boarded her and in the customary way Lewis remained in the boat, which was tied on broadside to the ship and being towed along. The tow-line parted, it is assumed, and the pilot-boat was driven off. There was a motor engine in the boat, but this Lewis did not know how to operate, as Malone used to be his engineer. It was not until he had decided the V. was at Bowring's South Side premises that Malone discovered the disappearance of his associate and at once gave an alarm. The crews of Pilot-boat No. 2 spent all night searching for the missing man, but without success. Inquiries were made on the fishing grounds and none of the fishermen there could give any information of Mr. Lewis's whereabouts. This morning the tug D. P. Ingraham took part in the search, though up to 1 p.m., after cruising over a considerable area, there were no tidings of the missing man. Mr. Lewis was one of our oldest pilots a resident of Cochran Street, and a prominent figure in the East End.
