Mr. Richard Cashin

DIES AT THE HOSPITAL.

Mr. Richard Cashin, third son of Hon. M. P. and Mrs. Cashin, who broke his leg at Cape Broyle, on Wednesday last and was removed to the General Hospital on the same day, passed peacefully away at 5.30 yesterday afternoon. Early yesterday morning deceased was found to be suffering from pneumonia caused by his having lain for over one hour on the wet ground on the day of the accident. At 6.30 a.m. yesterday he became unconscious, and despite the skill of Malley, the specialist who had been attending Sir Wm. Reid, and of Drs. Keegan, Anderson, Cowperthwaite and McDonald, he passed away at the time mentioned. Rev. Fr. Duhaime was called to his bedside and administered the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church. Deceased was only 24 years of age and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. He was educated at St. Bonaventure's College where he had a brilliant career. Leaving school he was attached to the Bank of Nova Scotia here and was later transferred to the branch at New Waterford, N.S. Last year he returned to Cape Broyle and assisted in his father's business. Left to mourn are three brothers, Lieut. Peter now in charge of a machine gun section of a British Regiment in France; Lawrence and Martin at Cape Broyle, and one sister, Miss Mary Cashin of this city. To these and the grief-stricken parents the Telegram offers deep sympathy.

The remains were conveyed to the residence of Hon. M. P. Cashin, Queen's Road, last night and from there were taken to the Railway Station at noon to-day and placed on board a special train for Cape Broyle, where interment takes place.

Died on Shipboard.

Mrs. Winifred Davis, of Newbridge, Salmonier, died suddenly on board the S. S. Portia shortly before that steamer entered port yesterday. She joined the steamer at Salmonier and had not complained during the passage. She was found cold in death yesterday by Mrs. Brown, a friend passenger, who went to call her. Drs. Hogan and Campbell examined the body on arrival and found the death was due to chronic heart trouble. The body was removed to the mortuary rooms of Undertaker Martin to be prepared for burial.

With the U. S. Forces.

Mr. Michael Hayes, a former resident of St. John's, is now attached to an American Hospital Corps at the Front. He crossed with the first of the Red Cross workers. Prior to his leaving here 10 years ago, he was engaged as a chemist with McMurdo & Co. He has a brother James who is a veteran soldier with the Canadians. They are sons of Mr. James Hayes, George's Street, and grandsons of the late Thomas Hayes, butcher.
