SYDNEY, N.S., April 14.—Phelys Kariben, the young Austrian barber, Aarloen, the young Austrian barber, arrested by the reserve police force Sunday night, charged with the mur-der of his partner, Tom Gummy, when questioned by Chief McCormack this morning denied all knowledge of the crime, and beyond that made no state-ment whetever bundle shall contain twenty-four hoops manufactured of hard timber.
