Report of The St. George's Coal Fields for Year ending December 31st. 1919.

At our annual meeting held on Feb. 3rd last, the report then submitted, contained the following:

"Of the first issue of \$25,000.00 then on the market \$15,924.00 had been subscribed, leaving a balance of \$9,076.00 to be taken up, while prospecting work up to that period had completed 150 feet of tunnelling on the Jukes Seam, which at its outcrop gave 4 feet 9 inches of good clean coal, while with the 150 feet of tunnelling completed, a thickness of 5 feet 4 inches of coal had been reached, and the seam showed a tendency to thicken. The estimated body of coal in sight from the above work was conservatively placed at 4725 tons. It was also estimated that when 250 feet of tunnelling has been completed a body of at least 10,000 tons of coal would be in sight."

The foregoing is given so that you will be better able to make comparisions, and draw your own conclusions from the following account of operations during the year just closed.

From January to April, 1919 work was continued on the Juke's Seam, and two tunnels were completed for a distance in all of 320 feet with the ment in this country in the past, which

"The north tunnel was completed for a distance of 165 feet, giving at to be slow, and special inducement this distance a solid face of coal had to be offered in order to awaken measuring 5 feet 9 inches in thickness. The south tunnel was driven for a distance of 155 feet giving at this length a solid face of coal measuring 6 feet in thickness. 1000 feet further south on its line of strike, and on the bank of the Barachois River the seam was again cut exposing another 6 foot face of solid coal; thus proving the seam was not only

The Jukes Seam has now been exposed for a distance of 1400 feet along its line of strike, at a depth of 135 feet below its outcrop, giving an available body of coal in sight of 38,980 long tons, while we might add that it is geologically estimated to run right through the property In fact this seam alone may now be considered a mine in itself.

The Cleary Seam.

Located 1200 feet east of the Jukes has been uncovered for a distance of 150 feet along the line of strike, showing at its outcrop 2 feet 2 inches of good clean coal, while after being sunk upon for a depth of 12 feet the thickness increased to 2 feet 5 inches, with a tendency to thicken. The coal is of the very finest quality.

The Howley Seam.

On the Robinson River, 21/2 miles east of the Jukes, has been exposed at its outcrop for a distance of 150 feet, giving a thickness varying from 4 to 11 feet of good clean coal. A tunnel is now being driven upon the lode, some 50 feet of which has been completed, and the intention is to complete it for at least 300 feet, when it is hoped to get a fair estimate as to its average thickness and continuity. So far the coal taken out is proving to be of excellent quality.

The Murray Seam.

On the Barachois River, 2 miles from the outcrop of the Jukes, has feet board measure, and 95,000 cords feet along its line of strike showing an average thickness of 5 feet 4 inches of coal. A tunnel has also been started on this seam and some 25 feet completed, showing a considerable improvement in quality. It is also anticipated to complete 300 feet of tunnelling on this Seam if necessary as the Seam is estimated to conain 6 to 7 feet of coal.

Three other seams containing coal have been located as follows:-(1) About 200 feet north of the Murray Seam an outcrop was located in the bed of the River but owing to the approach of adverse weather which caused the river to rise, prospecting work had to be discontinued. (2) Midway between the Jukes and Diamond Seams, an outcrop was

uncovered on the bank of Barachois River, showing about 5 feet of mixed coal. The more important work in hand on the Murray, Howley and Diamond Seams made further work on this seam out of the question until the coming spring. It is however, felt that this seam should carry a valuable body of coal, as the ground is regular giving no appearance of ever being disturbed.

(3) About 150 feet west of the Jukes Seam another outcrop has been located but when opened up for some 15 to 20 feet was found to contain only 8 to 10 inches of coal. This however, may yet prove to bea valuable seam as the walls obtaining the coal and shale are some four feet apart. Work here has only been temporarily abandoned to follow up the more important seams referred to.

Capitalization.
