What Size Do You Take?

Few people understand the meanings of the numbers and sizes on articles of clothing.

In hats and caps the size is one-half the sum total of the long and short diameters of the head. In other words, if your head measures 18 1/2 in., your size in hats is 6 1/2.

The size in gloves indicates the number of inches round the knuckles when the hand is closed.

The length in inches of your foot is the "number" you take in socks. In women's hose the length of the leg is usually three times the length of the foot.

If a woman's foot measures 9 in., her size in shoes is 2. Every quarter of an inch above 8 1/2 increases the size by one.

A man with a foot 11 in. long should wear size 7 boots. The size increases by one in every 1/4 in. in men's foot-wear.

Mob Attempts to Lynch McNeal.

ST. CATHERINES, Ont., August 16.—Mob rule and civil authority have been at the point of balance in the town of Thorold since before four o'clock this afternoon. At a late hour to-night a crowd of nearly 1,000 people still surrounded the town hall clamoring for the body of David McNeal, who this afternoon was committed for trial on a charge of murdering four-year-old Margaret Boucock on July 15 last, and who the crowd believed is the only person who can account for the disappearance of six-year-old Kathleen Beechman, missing since May 24.

The mob set fire to the town hall to-night and smoked McNeal and the police officers out of the building. "We surrender," yelled McNeal as he came down the stairs with Chief Frank Collins of Thorold, hanging to his steel wristlets.

McNeal was seized and rushed over in front of the town hall to an automobile. A rope taken from the town hall pole was run up a pole and preparations were made to hang him.

He screamed for mercy while the mob howled like demons. "Give him a chance," called someone, and that met with popular approval. "Men, if you are men, give me a chance to make a statement," cried the poor, blood-stained wretch. "It may be my last words on earth."

McNeal and the crowd later moved to the public library steps.

McNeal spoke for half an hour before a hushed crowd. He swore by the eternal he had not killed Margaret Boucock. "Only a degenerate could do such a thing," he said.

From one section of the great audience came insistent appeals. "Give the man a chance, haul him over to the police."

When McNeal ceased speaking there was no further talk of lynching. The crowd was almost jovial. No one touched McNeal as Chief Mains and his men supported the prisoner to an automobile and he was rushed off to Welland before there was time for the crowd to change its mind.

The damage to the town hall is estimated at several thousand dollars.

England to Quit European Muddle at Once.

LONDON, Aug. 18.—Great Britain is going to pull out of Europe. This is the determination of the Government, given by the highest authority. Within a few weeks the Government proposes to cut loose from the mess of continental politics, and to return to its traditional policy of isolation and minding its own business as America already has done. It will see the Polish troubles through, and, if the Russians really try to destroy Polish nationality, it will help Poland in association with the other Allies, but after that it is through.

This decision is due to pressure of home affairs, Ireland, the labor situation, and other problems waiting to be dealt with which international complications have compelled the Government to neglect, but which insistently are demanding settlement and will not wait. Also it is due to need for economy and a strong public demand for attention of the paying of debts and the reducing of taxation.

France to Explain.

At the same time I am informed Prime Minister Lloyd George is answering Kamenoff, said that England had no intention whatsoever of recognizing General Wrangel, and will withdraw support from him as soon as he starts an offensive war.

The only thing that can change the British attitude is opposition of impossible terms by Russia upon Poland, taking away that nation's independence.

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Schooner Built to Burn.

SAILOR'S PROPHECY CAME TRUE.

St. John, N.B., Aug. 19.—A prophecy made by one of the crew of the large St. John built schooner Netherton, that she was built to burn, has proved true in a sense, for word was received here yesterday that the craft, which has had such an adventurous cruise, has been abandoned on fire in mid-ocean. The Netherton was formerly the Dorfontein, and was held up and set on fire by a German raider at the mouth of the Bay of Fundy during the last year of the war and when the new craft was starting on her maiden voyage with a cargo of lumber taken on at this port.

No particulars of the last days of the Netherton have been received. The Dorfontein was a four-masted schooner of 666 tons net register, and was built here in 1918, the first wooden vessel of deep sea size to be constructed at this port for many years. She cost \$100,000, and with a cargo of 900,000 feet of lumber left here for South Africa in August, 1918. Far down the Bay of Fundy she was held up by a German U-boat Number 56, and after being stripped of her movable possessions, she was set on fire. The crew of nine were taken on board the submarine and were well treated by the Germans. The captain and sailors were landed on Grand Manan Island, and later the charred hull of the big vessel was sighted by fishermen and towed into Seal Cove. About 400,000 feet of lumber was saved, and the hull, burned close to the water line, was towed to Eastport.

The Dorfontein was bought by the firm of Pushes Bros., of Dennisville, Me., and was practically reconstructed. She was placed in commission under command of Captain Jasper, of Machias. For nearly two years she engaged in the hard pine trade out of Mobile, Ala., and St. Andrews, Fla. She was equipped with a 35-h.p. engine, which supplied electric lights and power for hoisting the sails.

Press Delegates Tour Grain Belts.

MOOSE JAW, Sask., Aug. 19.—The grain fields between Regina and Moose Jaw were traversed by automobile by the delegates to the Imperial Press Conference yesterday afternoon, completing their tour of inspection of western Canada's grain farms. In the last few days they have passed through several hundred miles of grain fields by motor in the course of their journey through Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The general opinion of the newspapermen of the party, many of whom have a practical knowledge of farming, is that there is a species of wizardry in the production of crops in western Canada, with a minimum of effort and expense. "It is a land of the future, and very immediate future," one delegate expressed it.

The reception in Moose Jaw occupied an hour or so, and took the form of a garden party at the Canadian Pacific Railway Gardens, at which Mayor Hamilton was the host. His brief address of welcome was responded to in kind by Sir Frank Newnes, publisher of the Strand Magazine, Tit-Bits, and other British magazines. The party left early for Calgary, at which point the newspapermen will be entertained with an Indian and wild west demonstration to-day.
